

### BULL MOOSERS IN WALSH ARE LOST

#### NEW PARTY MEMBERS FAIL TO REGISTER, ACCORDING TO ASSESSORS' RETURNS

Walsh county is not registering many members of the progressive, or Bull Moose party, such showing being made in a report by the county auditor, as published by the Walsh County Record.

In almost the entire county, only 28 voters registered as progressives, while in the city of Grafton, not a single Bull Moose is registered.

The Walsh County Record says: "Lost, strayed or stolen, one political party named progressive, will be the caption of the want add run by 'bull moose' leaders after the primary election next month. If every county in the state sends in such returns as are being daily received by the auditor of Walsh county from the township assessors there will not be enough 'bull moose' votes June 24 to make a respectable county convention in any county of the state."

"Walsh county has 53 voting precincts and returns from assessors of 36 had been received leaving but 17 to hear from. The returns of the assessors show but 28 voters registering as progressives, or less than one to the precinct. In the city of Grafton with four precincts registering 365 votes not a single voter registered as a progressive.

"These assessors' returns give some interesting facts, and allow of some interesting deductions. The 36 precincts so far in show a total registration of 1,307 republicans, 1,089 democrats, 79 socialists and 28 progressives, with a scattering of prohibitionists, and quite a number who refuse to record their party preference.

"In 1912 these same precincts cast the following presidential vote: Republican 393, democrat 823, progressive 549, socialist 126. The republican and progressive vote of 1912 combined only gave a total of 942, which indicates that 365 republican voters in these townships stayed away from the polls altogether. The figures also indicate that 361 democrats stayed at home, while the socialists cast 47 more votes two years ago in these precincts than are now registered. Of the 17 remaining precincts, 11 are republicans and 6 democratic."

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL INSTITUTE

A Sunday School Institute was held at the Hofflund church last Sunday under the auspices of the Williams County Sunday School Association. The meeting was largely attended. Following the regular Scandinavian services in the forenoon, lunch was served in the church. The Institute

proper was called to order at 2:00 and presided over by Rev. A. H. Nelson, President of the Association. Rev. E. S. Shaw of Williston, preached his sermon and gave a short address on the modern Sunday School, also conducted a short question box. H. W. Braatelen spoke on the importance and influence of the Sunday School in its influence upon the youth, and urged the cooperation irrespective of creed in the effort to make good citizens. He referred also to the fact that this was Memorial Sunday and that in order to honor the old soldiers, we must be good citizens. President Nelson outlined the work of the State and County Sunday Schools, and urged attendance upon the County and State Conventions. Mr. T. M. Getchel gave a brief history of some County Sunday Schools with which he had been connected for 25 years. Mrs. Getchel spoke on the Cradle Roll. Excellent music was furnished by the choir, and all report the Institute a success and express the hope that a similar one will be held next year.

### HOME RULE BILL PASSES HOUSE

#### ULSTER DETERMINED TO PREVENT ESTABLISHMENT OF PARLIAMENT IN DUBLIN

London, May 25.—The Irish home rule bill passed its third reading in the house of commons today by a majority of seventy-eight. The closing scene in the fight brought together crowds of members and spectators, which filled the chamber to its utmost capacity.

Outside, great crowds awaited the result.

Under the provisions of the parliament act, the bill becomes a law after this stage, as it already has twice passed through all its stages in the house of commons in two separate sessions. The vote of the house of lords therefore will have no further effect.

#### Threaten Civil War

It will be a long, hard fight, possibly civil war in Ireland, before parliament is set up in Dublin, for the Ulster men are determined to protest that portion of the province is to be excluded from the operation of the bill, and threaten to establish provisional government as soon as the bill leaves the house of commons.

The eyes of England are on Ulster, where arrangements are being made to mobilize well armed volunteers. Arms and ammunition have been distributed and plans completed for calling out the volunteers at a moment's notice. Londonberry and Tyrone are the danger points, as there are Nationalists and Ulster men evenly divided. Both are armed.

### ELECTRIC LINE GETS CHARTER

#### ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION ARE TAKEN OUT FOR WILLISTON PROJECT

Bismarck, N. D., May 21.—Articles of incorporation for the Williams and Northern Railway company have been filed with the secretary of state and a charter issued.

The company is capitalized at \$10,000, with the following men as incorporators: A. H. Brown, H. W. Braatelen, W. H. Westergaard, F. P. Bergman and F. R. Zahl of Williston; N. N. Landro, George Hanson and A. J. Robinson of Stady; Hans Larson of Ruder, and M. A. Uven.

The estimated length of the road is 70 miles and it is to run through Williams and Divide county. It will begin at Williston, thence north 30 miles along the Muddy valley, thence northerly to a point on the Soo Line. Just what town on the Soo will be made the connecting point is not known. This will probably cause a rivalry between Crosby and Ambrose for the landing of the road.

### FEELS HIMSELF SLIPPING

The Rhame Review of Rhame, Bowman county, N. D., has the following to say regarding the candidacy of P. D. Norton and A. L. Simpson, for congressman from this district:

P. D. Norton, second choice Congressman from this district, not long ago played hockey from his duties at Washington, and came out to North Dakota, to look after some matters of patronage with the leading democrats of the state, and presumably also to fix up his fences a little for the coming primary campaign.

In the campaign two years ago, there were five candidates for the Republican nomination and Norton won because there was at that time a provision in the North Dakota law that if no one had a majority of the first choice votes, the candidate having the highest number of first and second choice votes should be declared the nominee. L. A. Simpson, of Dickinson, was high man, but Norton had made a special plea for second choice votes, and when these were taken into account, he had a few hundred more votes than Simpson, and was declared the nominee. That provision of the law has been repealed, so that this year, the high man is said to have three candidates this year, Norton, Simpson and a man from the north end of the district, but if this is true, we have not heard the name of the third man.

#### The Review's Position

As our readers well know, we opposed Norton two years ago, for reasons that we considered good, and we have seen no reason since that time to change our position. In fact, we believe there are stronger reasons now for opposing him than there were at that time, for he has had a term in congress, for he has had a very particular ability, and the fact he skipped out for home just at the time when the Mexican imbroglio was the most serious, does not put his position in any better light.

It seems that Norton can already see the handwriting on the wall, and knows that his days as congressman are about over. When the returns are all in after the June primaries it will be seen that he has been snowed under by a man who will be a real Congressman, who will do things for the district, and of whom the people will have no reason to be ashamed, the Hon. Leslie A. Simpson, the real choice of the people two years ago.

### DEMONSTRATION IN POLICE COURT

#### SHRIEKING MOB OF PRISONERS ASSAULT THE PRESIDING MAGISTRATE

London, May 22.—King George and Queen Mary were compelled to listen to the harangue of militant suffragettes while attending a matinee at His Majesties theater when a woman arose in one of the stalls, and began to address the king:

"You Russian czar, the woman chrieked. Attendants quickly rushed in and tried to get the woman out, but found that she had chained herself to the seat. They were forced to file through one of the links on the chain before she could be ejected.

While this was in progress, half a dozen women in different parts of the theater started shouting at the king. One of them jumped to the stage and commenced a speech.

When she had been thrown out, others began. Eventually, all the disturbers were ejected.

The police on the outside of the theater had a hard struggle to save the suffragettes from rough handling by the hostile crowd.

London, May 22.—The "wild women" of the Women's Social and Political union, the militant suffragette organization, continued their terrorizing tactics today by making two separate attacks on the national art treasures.

In the turmoil of battle in the vicinity of Buckingham palace, where a column of determined women yesterday attempted to reach King George with a petition, had barely subsided when early today a woman, armed with a loaded cane, ruined five masterpieces in the national gallery. Almost simultaneously another woman wrecked a picture hanging in the Royal Academy of Art. Both women were arrested. When fifty-seven of the women who fought at Buckingham palace were brought into court, they created such disorder that the proceedings were suspended.

#### Pictures Damaged

The pictures damaged at the National gallery are "Madonna and Child With Infants Saints," portrait of Gilaromo Matatini, "Saints John and Christopher and the dogs," "Landscape with the death of St. Peter," "Christ's agony in the garden" and the painting Gassax. At the Royal academy "Primavera," by George Claude was destroyed.
