CONCENTRATE ON BURDICK
Oakes Times—Usher L. Burdick for governor. Republicans would serve their interests and the interests of the state best by naming him as their standard bearer in June.

Usher L. Burdick is a product of North Dakota. He grew to young manhood on a Benson county farm, and received a thorough education, finishing at our own university and the university of Minnesota.

His ability was early recognized when he was sent to the legislature, and his second term there placed him at the head as speaker. Two years later he went back to Mismarck, but this time as lieutenant governor—presiding over the senate.

As a platform speaker he is one of our coming men. The writer heard him at Mandan five years ago when he and Governor Burke were on the program, and the speaker of the house brought more applause from the audience than did the governor.

Mr. Burdick has been a leader in the reform movement in North Dakota. He has always stood for the interests of the farmers, and can always be depended on to give them a square deal.

Some newspapers and some Progressive Republicans appear 'huffed' because Burdick was not endorsed by the Nonpartisan League for governor. The Times does not deem an endorsement of the League an asset, but rather a hindrance.

Personally he is clean. His manly bearing, his love of the outdoor life, his stand on the side of right, his experience as a legislator, makes him the ideal man for governor. That he typifies the best thought and sentiment of a large majority of the people is well known—and the only fear is that these forces in the state may be too much divided.

Thousands Will Be Disappointed

Chicago, May 16.—James B. Reynolds, secretary of the republican national committee, today began the task of answering an accumulation of 18,000 letters.
'More than 11,000 requests for convention tickets will be answered by the word no,' said Mr. Reynolds. 'Visitors from the different states will be obliged to look to the national committee from their home state for convention tickets. It is a waste of time to write to officers of the committee on the subject as they have no tickets to give out.'

BUCHANAN WILL BE TRIED SOON

CONGRESSMAN AND OTHERS CHARGED WITH CONSPIRACY GET EARLY TRIALS

New York, May 16.—Congressman Frank Buchanan and others, charged with conspiring to violate the Sherman anti-trust law by inciting strikes among munitions workers in this country, are to be given an early trial in the federal court, it was asserted here by a responsible government official after a conference in the offices of United States District Attorney H. Snowden Marshall.

The announcement is the result, it is understood, of daily conferences between Mr. Marshall and Assistant United States District Attorney Raymond H. Sarfaty, who presented the evidence to the grand jury, and the special government counsel who are to try the case, Judge I. B. Oeland of this city and John Lord O'Brien, former United States district attorney at Buffalo.

When Congressman Buchanan preferred charges against Mr. Marshall some time ago, it was announced that the trial would go over to the fall term. The decision today came as a surprise. The government is determined that there shall be no further delays in the case, it was stated, and with this end in view it is prepared to hand down superseding indictments in the event that the existing ones are quashed on the motion of the two defendants, submitted last week.

Last week it was declared that Congressman Buchanan was to file similar motions through his chief counsel, former Senator Joseph W. Bailey of Texas. It was learned today, however, by the government that the former senator has abandoned this intention.

The government, it was declared, is eager to bring the case to trial in view of the fact that new and allegedly startling evidence has been uncovered.

A rumor that David Lamar, known as 'the wolf of Wall street,' one of the defendants, may become a government witness in return for clemency, was neither affirmed nor denied by federal officials. It was expected, however, that Lamar might make overtures when he realized he cannot evade serving the two-year sentence given him for impersonating a congressman.

Lamar's appeal to the United States supreme court was recently denied and the mandate ordering him committed to Atlanta is expected to be handed down by the court when it reconvenes Monday next. Lamar has filed notice through counsel that he will submit a motion for a re-argument of his case—his last resort. Lamar is alleged to have handled the funds of the men named as conspirators.

Maximum Strength Of 261,000 Provided

Washington, May 16.—Revised figures on the army re-organization bill as agreed upon by the house and senate conferees and submitted to the senate by Chairman Chamberlain, show that the new army will be even larger than announced, when the agreement was reached last Saturday. Careful analysis shows that the maximum strength in time of peace will be 211,000 officers and men, including 25,000 staff officers, Philippine scouts and unassigned recruits and that the war strength will be 236,500 officers and constant troops, with staff officers, scouts, etc., added, will bring the aggregate maximum strength of

the regular army to 261,500. The national guard, as reorganized, would total 457,000, making a total of 718,500 available.

Results Satisfactory

'The results of the work of the conferees, while possibly disappointing to some few who have made hobbies of certain features,' Senator Chamberlain told the senate, 'must as a whole be welcomed by all who are reasonable and unprejudiced as a good bill. For the first time in our history, we have provided for an army that is well-balanced throughout and which will be an efficient fighting machine. It provides for troops enough for required over-seas garrisons and the remaining troops at home will be such as will make up complete brig-

ades and divisions and the regular army no longer will be the hit and miss collection of regiments and battalions, as it has heretofore been, due to piece-meal legislation of former years.'
