LITTLE LESSONS IN CORN FODDER

NOTHING BEATS CORN SILAGE OR WELL CURED CORN FODDER FEED WITH ALFALFA

After all the scientific mixtures and deep, hard-to-be-acquired mysteries about the complicated feeding of dairy cattle put out by professional teachers of the deep science, Prof. Andrew Boss of the Minnesota Experiment Station puts it all in a nutshell when he says—what all good stockmen knew before he said—"The best winter rough feed for milk cows is corn silage. The next best substitute is cured corn fodder. Either of these feeds supplementing alfalfa or clover hay makes an ideal ration for dairy cows."

It must not be forgotten, though, by the man without a silo, that there is corn fodder and corn fodder; fodder with the grain in it and fodder with the grain out of it. Much corn fodder—rightly grown, timely harvested and properly shocked and cured, and then rightly fed out—will be eaten up almost clean, and will, every pound of it, do good. Other fodder can be so grown, cured and fed that it is merely "corn stalks,"

and but little of it is eaten, and perhaps the less the better.

Some farmers, being acquainted with the latter kind of fodder only, have little faith in corn as a fodder, and doubtless think we over-estimate its value. We heard a farmer, at the Minnesota state fair this fall, say that he had never gotten enough good out of his fodder to pay for having it cut up. Another man in the same bunch, and by the way a very successful one, declared if he couldn't grow corn and corn fodder on his farms he would go out of the stock business, especially dairying; and growing stock and made this man one of the wealthy men of the state.

Again it is in the man and his methods.

Good Use of Corn

In a long journey recently through-out Minnesota and a part of North Dakota we saw much corn ripe enough to be cut up and being cut. A small percent of this corn was going into silos. A very few were stacking it green in large 18 to 24-foot wide stacks for "outdoor silage," but a great majority of those who were harvesting their corn at all were putting it in good-sized shocks and tying the tops closely. The corn generally was being cut, as it should be, a little on the green side.

All this we were glad to note, for it meant healthy, satisfied stock, and income from both growth and pail that leaves a profit.

When we make our butter from

costly mill feeds and high-priced hay, there is not much profit in it. Nor is there much money in growing \$30.00 yearlings on \$40.00 worth of store feeds. But the man who rightly grows and uses up a large acreage of corn in this northern country, has to be mighty careful or he will make a good substantial profit.—The Dakota Farmer.

RURAL CREDIT SITUATION

The Federal Farm Loan Board has just finished its tour of investigation through the southeastern states. It will start early this month upon the last leg of its nation-wide journey, visiting the balance of the southern states, and upon its return to Washington will take up the real work of determining the boundaries of the districts basing their actions thereon and the location of the respective banks therein on the vast fund of information accumulated on the four-months' tour of the United States.

The necessary blank forms for formal application for loans and charter for the local associations are being prepared and will doubtless be ready for distribution as soon as the land banks are established.

The Board has found time, however, to take formal action in connection with the matter of Joint Stock Land Banks. In view of the fact that representatives or agents of various private corporations have claimed, for stock selling purposes, that their respective company was organized under the Federal Farm Loan law or would later come under the operation of the provisions of that act, the Board has established the following rules:

First. That no charter will be granted to any Joint Stock Land Bank in the organization of which there has been any expense for promotion.

Second. That the consideration of charters for Joint Stock Land Banks will be deferred until the completion of the organization of the Federal Land Banks.

Therefore anyone now selling stock in loan organizations, no matter what it is called, under the claim that the company is operating under this federal law, is deliberately misrepresenting the facts.—The Dakota Farmer.

Gossip is not always kind, but it is sometimes illuminating. Two men—not women—were once talking about a neighbor.

"Why is it that Bill doesn't get along any better?" one asked. He works hard and tends strictly to business, yet his place is plastered for over \$5,000.00."

"Store bills," was the answer. "Last fall his store bill was over \$600.00."

"That's going some. Take \$600.00 out of the average wheat crop around here and you don't have much left."

"Not much," said No. 2. "That \$600.00 bill was bigger than mine—and I run a threshing machine. Fact is for my own house and needs, I don't run any store bill. I used to, but found out by painful experience where it was going to land me. So I went in strong for chickens and they are paying my way at the store. Funny thing about it, too—now that I am paying cash, or rather, eggs, for my stuff, I am not buying so much. I look at things a good deal longer and more carefully when I make myself dig right up before buying."

"I've watched the farmers around here for a good many years, and I haven't seen one yet that ran store bills much that made a go of it. They usually lose their land on mortgages. Bill's headed that way and going fast. He and his family buy anything and everything they want—paying for it is no immediate worry. But those bills pile up and they all have to be paid some day. Generally the land pays for them—and Bill hunts for a place to rent."—The Dakota Farmer.

Many things need to be considered in borrowing money. T. N. Carver of the U. S. Department of Agriculture lays down the following 5 rules to be discovered in securing a loan.

1. Make sure that the purpose for which the borrowed money is to be used will produce a return greater than needed to pay the debt.
2. The contract should provide for the payment of the principal at the most convenient time, that is when the borrower is most likely to have the means wherewith to repay it.
3. The length of time the debt is to run should have a close relation to the productive life of the improvement for which the money is borrowed.
4. Provision should be made in the long time loan for the gradual reduction of the principal.
5. As low interest rates as possible should be secured.—North Dakota Experiment Station.

Corn Unequaled Livestock Food

Corn and Livestock farming go hand in hand. The great corn growing sections are also the great livestock sections. Corn produces more stock food per acre than any other crop except alfalfa and it should be fed with alfalfa as these two feeds make a balanced ration. Corn is a very palatable food for stock. They relish the grain and also the fodder whether cured in the field or in the silo. Corn is unequaled in beef and pork production. The meat produced, when it is fed is of a firm consistency, just what is wanted. It is also fed to draft horses with good results. The palatability of the corn, the value of the annual products when corn is fed and the large amount produced make it especially valuable for livestock. The increasing of the corn crop in North Dakota will have a good deal to do with the extension of the livestock.—North Dakota Experiment Station.
