

# SENATE OPENS UP

CONVENES IN EXTRA SESSION IN OBEDIENCE TO PRESIDENT'S CALL.

LEFT SOME WORK UNCOMPLETED

PRESIDENT ASKS FOR ACTION ON THE CANAL AND CUBAN TREATIES.

NEW SENATORS TAKE THEIR SEATS

SMOOT OF UTAH AMONG THE NUMBER WHO TAKE THE OATH.

Washington, March 6.—In obedience to the president's proclamation the senate of the Fifty-eighth congress convened in extraordinary session at noon yesterday. An immense crowd witnessed the interesting ceremonies. Echoes of the Fifty-seventh congress had not died away when President Pro Tem. Frye called the body to order, and soon thereafter the senators who were re-elected and those who were to take their seats for the first time, with the exception of Mr. Gorman, who had seen long service in the senate, were sworn in. Friends and admirers of the senators loaded down their desks with beautiful floral tributes. One of the features of the opening ceremony was the ovation accorded Mr. Gorman.

The oath was to have been administered to thirteen new senators, but three were not on hand. The new senators are:

Ankeny, Washington; Clarke, Arkansas; Fulton, Oregon; Gorman, Maryland; Heyburn, Idaho; Hopkins, Illinois; Latimer, South Carolina; Long, Kansas; McCreary, Kentucky; Newlands, Nevada; Overman, North Carolina; Smoot, Utah; Stone, Missouri.

President's Message.

The president sent the following message to the senate:

"I have called the senate in extraordinary session to consider treaties concerning which it proved impossible to take action during the session of congress just ended. I ask your special attention to the treaty with the republic of Colombia, securing to the United States the right to build an isthmian canal, and to the treaty with the republic of Cuba for securing a measure of commercial reciprocity between the countries. The great and far-reaching importance of these treaties for the welfare of the United States, and the urgent need for their adoption, requires me to impose upon you the inconvenience of meeting at this time."

Mr. Cannon's speech in the house of representatives early Wednesday morning in presenting the conference report on the general deficiency bill in which he charged that the senate conferees had resorted to legislative blackmail and attacked the rules of the senate formed the subject of some fervid remarks by Mr. Tillman and by the senate conferees, Messrs. Hale, Allison and Teller.

The senate at 3:15 adjourned until Monday.

New York, March 7.—Ellen Vail, fifty-five years old, and Elizabeth Vail, twenty-two years old, her daughter, met death in a fire in East Seventieth street yesterday. The older woman was suffocated and the younger jumped from the fourth floor. The property loss by the fire was small.

## BLANKET OF SMOKE.

Causes Many Collisions Between Street Cars and Vehicles.

St. Louis, March 7.—A blanket of smoke and fog overhung the city, there being no wind to dispel it. There were numerous collisions between street cars and vehicles, but so far as known nobody has been seriously injured.

## Chaplain Is Exonerated.

Denver, March 7.—Chaplain C. Gavitt, U. S. A., has been exonerated by court-martial from the charge of not paying his debts, which was brought against him by a Chicago firm. Gen. Funston approved the findings.

## New Bridge Under Way.

Crookston, Minn., March 7.—The new steel bridge over Red Lake river on Main street is well under way. It will be completed about May 15, and will be one of the handsomest bridges in the Northwest.
