**SPEECH BY R. W. DALZIEL**  
Before a Regular Meeting of Ward County Socialists, March 26, '03.  
[CONTINUED FROM LAST WEEK.]

What the world needs today is an ideal. Socialism bears upon her pure and expansive forehead, the beauty crown of idealism. Communism was and is the ideal of the Savior, socialism is 20th century communism.

During Christ's earthly stay he taught communism, condemning riches and also those who held them to the suffering of others, and his disciples for 300 years who cared to follow Him closely, adhered strictly to this as to His other no more important instructions. It was only when men became more desirous of riches, of profits, of gains, on account of which the sinners were scourged from the temple, than they were for the kingdom of heaven that Christ's example as to communism was set aside and an effort was made to forget all about it and to appease the conscience and blind the mind to the fact that it is impossible to gain entrance to the kingdom of happiness and peace and justice and plenty and all that is good by "some other way."

It is not the avowed purpose of socialism to preach Christ as the gate to eternal peace, nevertheless we find pleasure and stimulus in the truth that in preaching socialism we are not teaching principles at war with God. Christians, we believe, must be socialists. The Christian is the man who prays "Thy kingdom come; Thy will be done in earth as it is in heaven" and means what he says. "Thy kingdom" means peace, content and equality among men. Are you trying to usher in "Thy kingdom" while the good things of earth are monopolized and enjoyed by a few and the rest—all the rest—are suffering the pangs of frost and starvation? Have you ever tried to lift yourself by the boot straps? That is just as easy and reasonable. "Thy will be done" means a "government of and by and for the people," whereas we now have a government of and by the people, but for the capitalist. Yes, it's of and by the people and we voters have no one to blame but ourselves, because we are wholly responsible for our ballots, and we have foolishly been putting the shackles upon our own wrists. If you saw a man riveting a ball and chain to his ankle, wouldn't you conclude that he had a mental shingle loose and flapping in the wind? How much less crazy are we voting kings who, during the years past, instead of recognizing the reasonableness of the class struggle, and voting for the class to which we belong, have been voting the same tickets as our own capitalist masters have voted, just as if we thought our interests were the same as theirs? The Christian who preaches Christ and righteousness and the right of private ownership of the earth or any fraction thereof might as well enter at once upon the task of forming an organization for the revision of the "Sword of the Spirit"—the Bible, and omit the Savior's condemnations of private ownership, so that his preaching may save more strongly of consistency.

When gospel preachers get on God's side of this question and preach for the people and equal laws and a just government, the effects will tell for good against evil.

Socialists stand for honesty; they believe in keeping their promises, as individuals and as a party; they always bear in mind that an unfulfilled promise is not better than a downright untruth. It is better to be alone than in bad company, but it is a thousand times better to be in good company than alone; if you are in old party company you would be better alone, but if you are with socialists, your company is pledged to strive for full recognition of the truth of the universal brotherhood of man. Socialists should keep happiness in their hearts and in their homes and should spare no opportunity to strike for laws and government which will insure the supremacy of happiness throughout the hearts and homes of the earth. I some times have a day dream of socialism as an established fact and I see first, those who, in former years, were all too familiar with poverty, want, discouragement, anxiety and heartaches, and I see the deeply plowed care furrows, gradually giving place to the more suitable dimples and smiles, and I see the effects of adversity and despair and heart burnings replaced by a bright reflection of peace, plenty and satisfaction. The robbers and murderers are becoming not only law abiding but law loving citizens, and whereas, under capitalism, they sought to destroy and wrong; under socialism there is no need for dark crimes, because all are equal in possession of the things that make men upright. And I see those who were the millionaires with stunted souls and only excuses for hearts, their greed for gain, transformed into lovers of God instead of lovers of gold, and the voices of those born to sing sweetness into the lives of men are cultured and developed because all have means and leisure time for the development of their natural talents, and I see the nimble fingers of workers flying across the key boards of musical instruments, producing the sweet chords that effect so much in making earth life heaven. And I see the man who under capitalism could not make women their wives because of the uncertainty of their ability to provide them the comforts of life; the husbands of contented, careful wives and the fathers of well-fed, well-clothed, happy children. I see the farmer drive into the peoples' elevator with his grain; the peoples' train come rushing in to the depot on the peoples' track, loaded with passengers whose happy faces bespeak of the satisfaction they feel in knowing that they are riding five miles for a cent and are getting their money's worth.


