FARM AND STOCK NOTES.

J. A. Waldref is planting ten acres of corn with two hand planters.

W. H. Mann is raising some expansion watermelons this year. He says he will have them so large they will fill a two bushel sack. By the way Mr. Mann is raising some more corn this year and will show the Ward county farmers what can be done with that cereal. Last year he raised 200 bushels from three acres and sold 100 bushels of seed to his neighbors this year.

Heavy showers of rain fell over this part of the state very generally Saturday and Sunday. Up until Sunday morning 1.6 inches of water fell and there were showers Sunday nearly an inch fell Sunday night. The rains were perfect soakers and the thirsty ground soaked up every drop of the water. The farmers have placed the price of their land five dollars per acre higher. The rains came just in the right time. Most of the wheat, oats, speltz, wheat and millet is in. Thousands of acres of flax are in and considerable of it is up. Where the ground is well pulverized the grain will grow so fast that the ground will soon be shaded and most of the moisture retained. We are having much more rain this season than last and everything looks a great deal more favorable.
