GLENBURN ON THE GRANVILLE EXTENSION

One of the most promising little burghs in the county is Glenburn on the Dakota and Northwestern. It is situated on Sec. 14 of Twp. 158 R. 82. Two months ago the name was not known. Now twenty or more progressive business men are located there and they are doing business too. They came with the intentions of remaining and brought in excellent stocks of goods. The farmers in that part of the county welcome their arrival for it saves them many a long drive.

A. S. Taylor & Son, the lumber merchants are succeeding even beyond their fondest expectations. They have a well stocked lumber yard and will put in a much greater stock as soon as they locate on their lot permanently. Since starting business, they have disposed of eighteen car loads of lumber all of which has been hauled from Minot. They handle the very best of building material. A coal and wood stock will soon be added. The business is being looked after by Chas. A. Taylor.

Ambrose Dwyer, the liveryman, has a good line of rigs and can take you to any desired place on short notice. He is making arrangements to build a new barn 32x100 feet with a lean-to. He has a feed and sale stable in connection with his barn. Mr. Dwyer is handling farm machinery, the Old Hickory Wagon, Rock Island, DeLancey and Diamond plow and will have in a big line in the spring. He will have a No. 1 dray line as soon as the new road is completed.

Simmons & Seaton are worthy energetic general merchants. They have a good building 24x30 filled with dry goods, groceries, boots, shoes, glassware, notions and fruits to the amount of \$5,000. It was necessary to build an annex at the rear of their store. Mr. Seaton was engaged in business in Grant county Ind. Mr. Simmons has been a resident of southeastern North Dakota but came from Baltimore, Md., prior to opening up the store here.

There are no Robinson Crusoes in Glenburn and it is necessary for the people to visit the barber shop occasionally. W. A. Fifield has a good shop in the Tribune office and has ordered new glasses, chairs etc. He proposed to have his shop equipped with the best of everything. He is an excellent workman, having held a position in the shop of the Hotel DuPont, of Grand Forks, the best in the state.

Goldberg Bros. occupy a building 24x30 feet in size which is crowded with a full line of general merchandise including gents' finishing goods, clothing, hats, men's and ladies' shoes, fur coats, fresh meats, tobacco and cigars. They are from Minneapolis and will not handle old or out of style goods.

Erud W. Peglow, recently from St. Paul is proprietor of a well stocked general store. He handles the "Gopher Brand" of groceries, and anyone who knows anything about groceries knows there are none better. He has a complete line of dry goods, shoes, gloves, caps etc. He also has a nice line of shelf hardware.

The first man on the town site was R. W. Smullen, the blacksmith. He has a homestead fourteen miles southeast of Glenburn, having proven it up. He put in a good shop and is prepared to do any kind of iron or wood work, plow work or horse shoeing.

Already arrangements are being made for a church and a school house. A town well will soon be drilled. The postoffice will be moved from Walter, half a mile away.

W. H. Huntley is proprietor of the restaurant and the hungry or weary cannot help but be satisfied after visiting his place. Mr. Huntley is the pioneer of Glenburn. When in the vicinity of the town hunt up Mr. Huntley for he serves meals at all hours.

C. B. Goodrich is the editor of the paper, the Glenburn Tribune. He has put in a first class outfit and is getting out an excellent paper. He is a hustler and will do something for the growth of the town.

One of the most enterprising citizens Glenburn has is the banker, Ed. S. Healey. Mr. Healey is the cashier of the bank which has been incorporated under the laws of the state with a capitalization of \$10,000.

W. A. Fifield will soon put up a building 24x50 feet with 20 foot posts. The upper story will be used for a hall and the first floor devoted to business purposes.

Loken Bros. are proprietors of the pool room. They handle soft drinks and have a very popular place.

Taylor & Son will build a fine residence 26x40. It will be cottage style.

T. L. Smith will erect a meat market building 24x32 feet.

R. W. Smullen will put up a blacksmith shop 24x50 feet.

A drug store will soon be opened in the town.

G. A. Hall expects to build an elevator.

Olson's Assailants Give Bonds.

Martin and Erick Mattison and Lye Storby, the three men accused of shooting Jorgen Olson near his claim west of Bowbells several months ago, which resulted in the amputation of his leg, were brought to this city last week in order to have them furnish higher bonds. Through the efforts of Bertie Nelson, Flaxton's legal light, they secured the necessary bonds, \$1,000 and went home Friday. Jens Peterson and R. F. Hadwin of Bowbells went on the bonds of the men. Their case will come up at the October term of court.

A representative of the Independent was told by Erick Mattison that the men would try to prove in court that the shot had been fired in order to protect themselves. Mattison says his wife has been very ill ever since the terrible event took place and it may be necessary to send her to the hospital. Mr. Olson ever says he was not armed and expects to see the men sent to prison.
