



## DEPOT BURNS AT TOWNER

Jim Hill's Building Catches Fire and Goes up in Smoke - Telegraphic Communication Cut off for Six Hours.

The Great Northern depot burned at Towner early this morning, everything being lost. By hard work about twenty trunks belonging to traveling men were saved. The origin of the fire is not known. The fire started about 2 o'clock in the morning and before the wires were destroyed, the night agent telegraphed to headquarters that the building was going up in smoke. No. 1, the passenger had not yet arrived, so a dispatch was sent ahead to have the train do what it could to put out the blaze. When the train arrived in Towner, the depot was nearly destroyed. All telegraphic communication was cut off until 8 o'clock this morning. Telegraphic instruments and stationery was sent to Towner from this city and work is being carried on, on top of a dry goods box. The depot was not a very good structure, but will be replaced immediately by a more modern structure.

### M. E. Church at Overholt.

An M. E. church was dedicated last Sunday at McKinney. Presiding Elder Moore and the pastor Rev. H. W. Hynes officiated. Considerable portion of the musical program was furnished by talent from Overholt, an appointment on the same circuit.
