The trial of Wm. Barry began at Langdon Tuesday. Barry killed the man who betrayed his sister, by choking him in his barn and stabbing him to death. He was sentenced to the penitentiary for life, but after serving seven years was granted a new trial.

Mr. Anna Grivelli, of Far with a force of fifteen assistants is busily engaged in preparing the North Dakota exhibits for the St. Louis exposition. Gr fruit, vegetables, etc., are sent from various parts of state and arranged for shipment.

A man who had been married four times recently applied in this state for a license to wed: a woman who had a trio of husbands before and figured that their marriage would be the ninth wedding for the two.

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
