A VERY MUCH MONTE CARLO TOWN

Four Hold Ups Reported to the Police This Morning, But Not One of the Highwaymen Could be Found--Pockets Picked in Broad Daylight--Tom Lacy Held up--Schilling Loses \$45 While Bowling. Mail Clerk Robbed of \$55.

Minot is getting to be a regular Monte Carlo town for hold ups and the like. This morning the police had half a dozen or more bold deeds reported to them, but up to this time have been unable to find a single wrongdoer. A number are suspected and arrests are likely to follow at any time.

Just before reaching this city Tuesday afternoon a young mail clerk, named Howland, who formerly worked in the Minot Postoffice, had \$55 stolen from him. He was talking with a young man with very short acquaintance and he pulled out his pocketbook to give him his card. They both belong to the Brotherhood. The stranger noticed that Howland had considerable money and watched him put the pocketbook back in his overcoat pocket. When Minot was reached the stranger kindly assisted Howland with his overcoat and Howland felt him reach in his pocket and a moment later missed the money. The stranger rushed out on the platform in the day light with Howland after him but soon disappeared in the crowd. Howland got out a search warrant for him, but was unable to locate his man. Mr. Howland claims that the stranger's name is Hugh Jennings, a former G. N. conductor.

A young homesteader named Schilling who has a claim near Minot, bowled in the Leland alley with a companion Tuesday evening and lay his overcoat on the seat back of them while he

went on with the sport. He later missed \$45 from the overcoat and believes the man with whom he was playing robbed him. He wished to get out a warrant for the arrest of the man, but could not do so for most any man could have taken the money.

A Russian came to this city in a wagon Tuesday afternoon and placed his horses in Scofield's livery barn. He did not care to be extravagant, so made his bed in his wagon. He rolled up one of his great coats for a pillow and just as he was about to lay it under his head, some one grabbed it and ran away with it in the darkness. The infuriated Russian gave chase, but did not find the man nor the coat.

Minot is harboring several suspicious characters who do not work and they are not known to gamble. They live in some manner. One in particular was a former blind pigger at Towner and has been lying about one of our hotels—as a sort of a parasite. The officers, we understand have given him notice to dig out and he had better go or "show his hand."

Young Tom Lacy, son of Marion Lacy was held up in the alley back of the Rodgers lumber yard about eight o'clock by an unknown man Tuesday evening. Tom is only sixteen years old but was as frightened as if he had been a grown man. He didn't have much money but feared for his life. The highwayman evidently took Tom for some millionaire or other.

BRAKEMAN RECEIVES SERIOUS INJURY

CHARLES GATES OF THIS CITY IS BLOWN OUT OF A BAGGAGE CAR AT WILLISTON SUNDAY.

Chas. Gates, a brakeman on a freight train, who makes his headquarters in this city, was badly injured at Williston by an explosion in the baggage car of the passenger train, about 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon. His leg and arm were broken, but the report given in another local paper to the effect that a leg and arm were blown off, is totally false. A bad gash was cut across the eye but from the latest reports, the Independent is given to understand that the man is not in much danger. His wife who resides in this city, received a telegram Tuesday morning stating that her husband and another railroad man by the name of Smith, were receiving the best of care in the hotel at Williston.

Mr. Gates' train stopped at Williston to wait for the passenger train which leaves Minot each forenoon at 10:45. When the train pulled into Williston, it was noticed that the baggage car was on fire and Mr. Gates and two other railroad men jumped into the car trying to put out the fire. The gasoline in the tank under the car exploded and Gates and Smith were blown clear out of the car. The bottom of the car was blown out. The explosion was terrific. Many windows in Williston were blown out and the town was badly shaken. Mr. Gates arose on one leg and attempted to lift Mr. Smith and Smith crawled up and attempted to assist his comrade to arise. Then both fell helpless to the ground. At first it was thought that Mr. Gates could not live but soon his injuries were not so great as first anticipated. Mr. Longeman, the engineer tells of the explosion. His engine was near the water tank while the explosion took place near the depot. The windows of his engine were blown out.

North Dakota Raises Corn.

North Dakota is coming right to the front as a corn growing state. Corn is raised in nearly every part of the state from Washburn east to Grand Forks. The Missouri and Iowa farmers who flocked into the state within the past two years are raising as good corn as they ever did in their old home states, when they have given the crop the same care which they did in the east. The varieties raised mostly are the yellow dent, smoky dent, and white and yellow flint. In Burleigh, Emmons and Morton counties, nearly every farmer has from 40 to 100 acres of corn which averaged last season from 45 to 55 bushels to the acre. The entire crops are consumed on the farms being fed to hogs and cattle. In Emmons county pig raising has become a paying industry and corn finished cattle are making the farmers rich. In Cass and Traill counties some fields cover from 1000 to 2000 acres.

Granville Branch Completed.

The Granville branch of the Great Northern railroad has been completed to Mohall and the golden spike was driven by Mrs. Hall last week. The ceremony was inspiring. A large crowd gathered to see the spike driven and cheer after cheer went up, as the people realized they were certainly in a progressive country. A picture of the road was taken and the band played some rousing selections. The road will be turned over to the company about Dec. 13, when the first train will be run. The construction trains have been the only ones which have run as yet, but they have gone some.

The dog was running a few feet in front of the horses and was not molesting anyone. The men in the wagon were surprised to hear the bullet whiz and see the dog drop dead. They were naturally very much frightened to have a bullet come so close to them. The man who fired the shot did so maliciously and it is too bad the bullet did not strike him instead of the dog.

Ed Anderson Fatally Injured.

Ed Anderson, a young brakeman, was struck by the engine of No. 2 in the Great Northern yards, as he was crossing the track Tuesday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock and received injuries from which he is dying. He had his coat collar turned high up around his neck and did not notice Engineer Flannigan backing his engine down the sidetrack to take it into the round house. The engine was going only four miles an hour, but was going fast enough to cause his death. Anderson's right arm was broken, his right side crushed and he was injured internally. His chin was cut also. He was placed on a stretcher and taken to the hospital but no hopes were given him from the first.

Neither Flannigan nor the fireman, Charlie Sandberg, saw the man crossing the track and can hardly be blamed for the accident. The crossing is a dangerous one and the city should take steps at once and compel the Great Northern to put in a crossing and a gate keeper.

Anderson was injured at Mohall but five days before he received the fatal injury, and had a very close call there.

A prostitute was killed in one of the houses of ill fame at Williston Tuesday night and the conductors on the trains running into Minot were notified to be on the lookout for her slayer.
