## FORMER MINOT PRINTER THREATENS TO KILL SWEETHEART

Who Paid Attention to Another Fellow—is Arrested by Deputy Sheriff and Thrown into Jail—out on Bonds to Keep Peace.

The following regarding H. C. Walker, a former typesetter on the INDEPENDENT and the Reporter, who has also taught school in this part of the state, was taken from the Towner News & Stockman:

The way of the lovers are not always strewn with roses. Such was the case H. C. Walker, a young man, aged 30 years, of Balfour.

It seemed that for some time passed Walker had been paying marked attention to Miss Mary Mackin a popular teacher of the Balfour school. Miss Mackin did not encourage his suit, but instead accepted the company of other young men. This rather riled the ire of Mr. Walker and

he proceeded at once according to reports to inform the young lady that unless she gave up her other company and married him, he would kill her and commit suicide. Miss Mackin did not fancy such an idea so she sent for deputy sheriff Leberg of Velva who placed Walker under arrest and brought him to Towner Saturday where he was placed in the county jail.

Monday he had a hearing before Judge Kline who placed him under \$800 to keep the peace. Bonds were furnished and Walker was released yesterday. State's Atty. Weber appeared for the prosecution and Att. C. D. Donnelly for the defense.

### Not Safe to Enter Wells.

Sam Fangstrom was killed by gas and Dan Cooper, who tried to pull the man from the well on the C. L. Christianson farm near Flaxton, was overcome so badly that he was unconscious for hours. The men had been boring a well and blasted a rock forty feet below. A lighted lantern was lowered into the well, and as the light was not extinguished, Fangstrom went down. He was soon overcome and Cooper lowered himself into the hole. He had no sooner reached the bottom than he became unconscious. He was pulled out more dead than alive. It is believed that the fumes from the exploding dynamite caused the trouble.

### Five Acres of Beans.

J. J. Brand of Sawyer took the Independent's advice last spring and planted five acres of White Navy beans. He now wants a bean thresher, but not being able to buy one, will flail the beans out and give his four bright boys a chance to make a little spending money. Beans do very well here and Mr. Brand will get fully 200 bushels of beans from the patch and as they sell for four cents a pound or over \$2 a bushel, he will do fairly well. It is little work to take care of them he says. He plants them in rows three feet apart, cultivated them twice and hoed them once. He is also making a great success raising potatoes. He had eight acres this year which yielded 1600 bushels and at 25 cents a bushel they bring \$400. One potato from his patch measured eleven inches long.
