

FARGO DOCTOR FORCED FROM THE TRAIN

Dr. Kaess Arrested Tuesday Morning and Comes Near Landing in Jail--Charged With not Paying His Just Debts--Looked Serious for a While.

Dr. Kaess, a prominent Fargo physician, was arrested just after he had boarded the morning passenger bound for his home Tuesday morning and forcibly taken off the train. The doctor would have put up a good fight, but he saw that it was of no use, so meekly submitted to the will of the officers of the law.

The charge against the doctor is a serious one, that of attempting to leave the city without paying his just debts. The Fargo professional men as a rule are gentlemen and it is yet to be proved that Dr. Kaess is not one also, but his actions were suspicious to say the least.

The trouble came about just like this: Monday afternoon when John Schlanser, another Fargo man was arrested, charged with stealing table linen and silverware from the Leland hotel, no one seemed to be willing to pay the costs of the trial. As Dr. Kaess was the guardian of the Fargo Knights of Columbus, the jolly good bunch, that attended the installation of the Minot council, the members concluded that it fell to his lot to pay the expense incurred by the trial, and upon his refusal to do so, a warrant was sworn out for his arrest. When the doctor had squared himself, the train was far on its way east, so he concluded to remain over for a few days and hunt.

The annual Jewish holidays will begin Wednesday evening at 6 o'clock. During that time the Boston Store will remain closed.


Mrs. A. C. Fling, Eugene Teutsch and his little son, returned from a visit in Minnesota. They fished at the lakes and had a good time generally.


