The Tolley Journal claims that a Minot deputy who was sent to that place to make an arrest, insulted a woman at that place by calling her a liar.

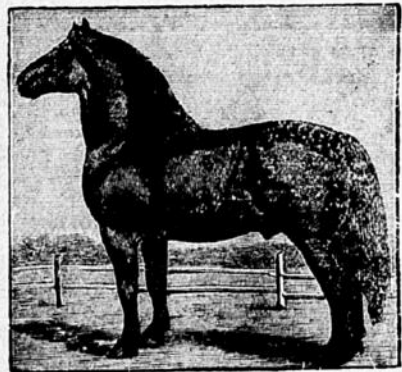

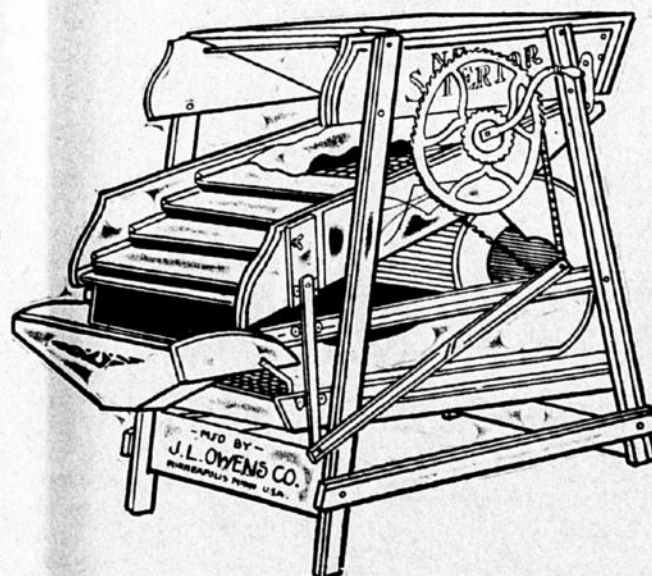
