MOUEY WAS NOT NEEDED.

The money was not needed 7890\$. .8 How The Padelford Family at Deering Turned Down Assistance Offered By Their Iowa Friends.

An amusing incident in connection with the recent winter, comes from Deering and is worthy of note. Five miles west of Deering there resides a well to do farmer by the name of C. P. Padelford, formerly a brakeman on the Northwestern road from Eagle Point, Iowa. He railroaded for years and savey nary a cent, when his star of destiny guided him to North Dakota. He managed to rake money enough together to file on a good claim, but had little left, not even a team of horses or a cow, or as he put it, "not enough to invest in a dozen chickens." This was six years ago, mind you. He doesn't know any more about farming than a pig does about ice. Today he has nine head of first class work horses, some cows and pigs and is free from debt on his homestead, has plenty of good machinery bought and paid for, besides recently bought an adjoining quarter. He will this year probably crop 300 acres of land. Besides he loaned his father-in-law a thousand dollars with which to pay on a farm in South Dakota. Besides he has plenty of money in the bank and his credit is practically unlimited. He is worth today practically \$12,000. He refused \$4,000 spot cash for his land not long ago.

When the terrible stories of suffering were being circulated in the east by those interested in the sale of southern lands, some of the friends of the Padelford family in Iowa believed them and sent a draft for \$50 with which to get out of the God forsaken country. Another friend sent \$10, and still another sent several telegrams which were delivered at the farm, begging them to pull up stakes and get out. Another friend telegraphed to the Deering agent a ticket for the family. Of course the money was returned, and the tickets were not used. Under the circumstances Mr. C. P. Adelford and family felt very much chagrined for they had not suffered in the least for fuel or food, and on the coldest day of the winter Mr. Padelford and family felt back.


