## State News

In the irrigated district near Williston the farmers are planning on raising potatoes for export.

The village of Bowbells will be bonded for \$12000 for a first class waterworks plant and good fire protection. Only a few votes were polled against this proposition, which shows that the citizens of Bowbells are of the right thinking sort.

Geo. Beltz, of Granville, from a 35 acre tract secured 25 bushels of wheat per acre. He will make considerable money this year.

Miss Inez Cornell lost her suit case between Ray and the Nesson ferry while on her way to her claim near Schaffer. It contained much of her clothing and all her savings for the past year. She was nearly overcome with joy when A. S. Wisner, who found it, handed it to her.

Hans Gunderson's little boy at Berwick, found a loaded revolver in a drawer and was not satisfied until he had shot a hole through his hand. The nervous little fellow put the gun back where he found it and notified his parents of the accident.

Albert Steer, big farmer south of Westhope, has thirty head of work horses, all of which have the glanders and will have to be shot. Four have already been killed. Mr. Steer was called to Iowa by the illness of his mother and has not done a bit of fall plowing.

What is the matter with this beautiful fall weather? Not a sign of a snow storm and the farmers are doing their fall plowing, getting their threshing done and grain marketed nicely. Now lay in a good supply of coal, and whether we have an open winter or a severe one, you will be able to use it sometime. Last year about this time, about two weeks earlier, we believe, we had our first snow storm.

Mrs. Susan Walley, who resides on a claim south of McCullough, Williams county, was severely burned while burning a fire break about her home. Her clothing caught fire, and she being alone, rolled on the ground. Her cries brought some neighbors from half a mile distant. The woman's hands and limbs were severely burned; she is taking treatment in the Minot hospital.

M. H. Frank of Bergen had a wonderful yield of flax. Sixty acres averaged 20 bushels.

Banker Regan, a state senator from Fessenden, was one of the notables attending the Elk's celebration a week ago last Saturday. The Senator is popular in the legislature, and stood a good chance at the last session of being elected Speaker. The Minneapolis Journal is authority for the statement that Regan is mentioned as a possible candidate for congress.

Dr. Doran and his brother, the specialists visited Minot last week. They reported a mighty poor business, as the people who need the services of competent physicians, usually patronize the home doctors, who are up-to-date in every way.

Westhope is all in a fever over the discovery of gas, which was accidental. On the W. B. Parker farm, four miles south of that place while drillers were at work, gas was struck at a depth of 170 feet in such quantities that the pump was forced clear out of the ground, and the 140 feet of casing has had to be anchored down with cross beams laid in cement. Kansas City men of experience in gas wells have taken hold of the affair and a drill capable of going down 2500 feet has been bought and is being shipped to Westhope. The company has purchased leases from the farmers in that vicinity, and will go after gas for all they are worth.

Towner is proud of the recognition shown one of her citizens. Referring to Mr. Gorman, the Towner Tribune says: It would be a matter of good fortune to the country at large if all the positions of public trust could be filled by men of such sterling integrity.
