### Great Northern Ry Installs Daily Train Service Between Minot and Crosby.

The Great Northern Railway has just issued a circular announcing the installation of Daily Except Sunday passenger train service between Minot, N. D., and Crosby, N. D., to become effective on the 4th of November. Stops will be made in both directions at Berthold, Aurelia, Woburn, Lygnite, Crosby and all intermediate stations.

Under new schedule train leaves Crosby at 7:30 a. m., reaches Berthold at 11:30 a. m., and arrives at Minot at 12:15 p. m. Returning train leaves Minot at 4:00 p. m., and Berthold 4:45 p. m., arriving at Crosby at 8:45 p. m.

Connection is made at Minot with Great Northern Railway train No. 4, The "Oriental Limited," eastbound to Devils Lake, Grand Forks, Minneapolis, St. Paul and all principal intermediate points, and with No. 5 westbound.
