It is only a question when the present decline will run its course, or how high wheat and flax will be wanted abroad. We dare say were it not for the present unsettled state of affairs, financially in this country, the price of cash wheat would right now be near \$1.25 per bushel.

Cash contract wheat in Chicago is now more than 25c per bushel under Liverpool which is more than the full shipping difference, a condition without a precedent, and which cannot last. A great deal more has been contracted for and will be shipped during the next few months, and exporters say much more could be sold if it were possible to arrange with the banks to finance the transactions. Of course such details must and will be arranged in time, and this is why we think wheat and flax a great investment at current prices.

Owing to the unsettled state of affairs in Eastern financial circles, and the late slump in Stocks and Securities, it was only natural that the grain markets should temporarily suffer some. That the decline in the price of wheat and flax has not been greater bespeaks a legitimately strong situation, and while they are under the hammer or on the bargain counter, we think the opportunity a great one in which to invest in wheat or flax. It would seem hardly necessary for us to refer at length to the existing strong situation in all grains. Conditions in that respect are unchanged, and wheat and flax will sell as soon as the financial atmosphere clears, or we might say, again becomes normal.

Registered Jersey Bulls for Sale.

Bull calf dropped January 26, 1907, sire Idle Hour, St. Lambert 67205, dam King's Exile Lady 197123. This calf is solid color, with black tongue and switch; his sire is by King of St. L's King 30752 who sired 34 daughters who made from 14 lbs. to 24 lbs. 6 oz. butter in 7 days, and was out of Edsie Bonner with a test of 21 lbs. butter in a week. His sire was out of Princess of Eau Claire, a grand-daughter of the famous Mela Ann 5444 and a full sister to Dels S. of Eau Claire 19 lbs. 3 oz. and one of the cows in the St. Louis test; Princess of Eau Claire had a test of 17 lbs. 8 oz. The dam of this calf is a pure St. Lambert of strong constitution and a large milker and butter maker.

Bull calf dropped April 13, 1907, sire Imported King of Hamble 65298, dam Jane Noonan, 146721; this calf is solid color with black tongue and switch; his sire is by Eminent 2nd P. 2532 H. C. who sold for \$10,000, won state prize over the island of Jersey in 1901 and 1902 and sire of 9 cows with tests from 16 lbs. 13 oz. to 24 lbs. 2 oz. butter in 7 days; King of Hamble has been pronounced by competent judges to be Eminent's best son. The dam of this calf Jane Noonan has a test of 18 lbs. 13 oz. butter in 7 days; she gave 7540 lbs. milk in one year and comes from some large milking American bred strains.

Bull calf dropped May 26, 1907, sire Imported King of Hamble 65298 (see above), dam, Gladys of Idle Hour

181738; this calf's dam is a big milking young cow who has given over 40 lbs. milk in one day and will without doubt be tested soon. This calf is solid fawn with black tongue and switch.

Bull calf dropped June 3, 1907; sire Brown Bessie's Bubchen 68557, dam Hog line 157717; Brown Bessie's Bubchen was by Recorder 22236, sire of 11 cows testing from 15 lbs. 2 oz. to 20 lbs. 1 oz. butter in seven days and out of Brown Bessie, 20 lbs. 8 oz., winner at the Chicago World's Fair dairy test; the sire of this calf traces to the high Combination strain; the calf's dam is of St. Lambert breeding and a remarkable individual; she is a large milker. This calf is a well grown youngster and bids fair to be a large handsome bull as his pedigree gives him the right to be.

Bull calf dropped September 14, 1907, sire Idle Hour Blue Belle Prince 72292, dam St. Lambert Prospect; the sire of this calf is a grandson of the famous imported Blue Belle, who sold for \$3,800 and of Golden Fern's Lad, believed by many to be the greatest Jersey bull living; his dam was sired by Idle Hour St. Lambert (see above) and out of Amy of Prospect who was a daughter of Two Hundred Per Cent and out of Crotona Signal; this calf combines the best American and Island strains; is solid colored, with black tongue and switch.

How Senger Makes Farming Pay.

A. J. Senger, one of the prosperous Norwich farmers, was in the city Wednesday with 58 fine fat turkeys which he sold for 12 1/2 cents a pound live weight. I always sell my turkeys about this time of the year, and unless I should do so, they would soon eat their heads off. Turkeys will pick up the loose grain in the fields until the weather commences to get cool, then they will hang around the barn and want you to feed them. I fed them some speltz, as I consider wheat too expensive. Mr. Senger raised some macaroni wheat, which he saved in the bundles to feed his chickens during winter. He likes to make them scratch for their living, as it makes them do well. His macaroni wheat averaged only about 10 bushels to the acre this year, for he sowed it last, and did not get around to drag the ground until it had dried out too much.

He farmed 350 acres with only the help of his son, getting an average of 13 bushels of wheat per acre and 10 bushels of flax. He hired a man a few weeks in the fall.

Mr. Senger milks several cows, sells butter and always has some cash in his pockets. Such will make North Dakota's land worth \$50 an acre some day.

Mrs. John Page, aged 105 years, North Dakota's oldest inhabitant, died at Olga, Cavalier county. The remains were interred beside those of her mother, Mrs. Jeanette Pelky, who died there years ago at the age of 114 years. Mrs. Page was born on the townsite of Winnipeg, then a frontier post of the Northwest Fur Co. She lived there half a century, married Jos. Page, and reared a family of eighteen children.

Two prominent Towner citizens yanked the conductor and brakeman from a freight train from a caboose in that city and gave them a severe beating, because they refused to cut their train in two at the crossing. The railroad men were taken to the caboose where they remained two hours, until bailed out. The Townites have grown very impatient because the railroad men neglect to keep the crossing open.

SLOCUM HAS HERD TESTED.

Thoroughbred Jerseys on the Slocum Farm are Tested for Tubercular Germs and Found to Stand the Test Perfectly.

A. P. Slocum, who owns a splendid Jersey dairy farm a short distance north of the city, had his entire herd of cows tested for tuberculosis and the report was very satisfactory. The cows were tested by a competent veterinarian in this manner. Tuberculin was injected into each one and the temperature of the animals taken. If the temperature rises, then you may be sure that tubercular germs are present and one must be careful of the milk.

Frequently fat sleek cows will be infested with these germs, and no doubt each one of us has taken thousands of tubercular germs into our system, but owing to our healthy condition, they in most cases have been thrown off.

The state chemist, Prof. Ladd will soon order the inspection of every herd of cattle in the state and no doubt thousands of tubercular cows will be found. In such cases, these cows are not always killed, and if not too bad off, may be kept for breeding purposes.

Mr. Slocum however wanted to be satisfied that all of his milk is absolutely pure, so had his herd tested of his own free will. Mr. Slocum has invested something like \$20,000 on his dairy farm and is planning on increasing his herd next season.

Fire Engine.

At a meeting of the city council Monday night, a petition was received for a new fire engine. The city dads are favorable towards the proposition, and it is probable that a new engine will soon be ordered. Minot is rapidly growing and it is generally conceded that we need an engine of this kind very badly.

Nice Weather.

Well, well, well. Who would like a finer climate than we have. No one ever saw prettier fall weather than we are having right now. The air is balmy as on a September day, and worlds going on right along. Some plowing is still being done. Cattle can run on the ranges and in the pastures, and farmers are saving much of their hay.
