

THE MOUSE RIVER VALLEY

(By W. H. MANN)

The geography of the Mouse River Valley is simple and may be quickly learned. It is an oval shaped piece of territory about two and a half times as long as it is broad and extends in a southeast and a northwest direction. The upper end beginning far up into the northwest territory about one hundred miles across the International Boundary line and the lower half of the valley is to all within the northern central part of North Dakota and may be said to comprise about one fourth of the area of the state and includes not only the loop country but all the drainage of the tributaries of the Mouse River, which is the Principal river of the valley. This famous valley is practically all agricultural land, as the parts too hilly for agricultural purposes are very small in extent when viewed against the great expanse of the whole valley.

THE PRODIGALITY OF NATURE.
Nature in fashioning this valley has been very profuse and prodigal indeed, in the endowment of it, making it one of the richest, fairest and most healthful locations in all the great northwest. The altitude is perfect. The drainage is perfect. The sunlight is perfect and with an abundance of pure water here exists. Conditions that insure an extremely healthful place in which to live.

HER NEVER FAILING CROPS.
The heavy yields of grain and vegetables attest to the fertility of the soil which is of such splendid quality that there is perhaps no standard by which to judge it by. We might offer an illustration which might throw some light on it and which might give some idea of about how rich the land might be. Suppose we should ship the first two feet of an acre of our valley dirt to some New England state where the land is practically worthless. Without fertilizers and dig square holes that would contain one cubic foot of our soil and dig them say sixteen inches apart and fill them with it and then plant a turnip in each of the squares with the amount of summer's rain they have there. Those turnips ought to have a uniform dia-

meter of sixteen inches and they ought to bring fifty cents a piece in the Boston market. If any reader can tell how many cubic feet there would be in 2 feet off of any average acre of the Mouse River valley then they could ascertain what one crop would be worth. But Mr. Editor after one hundred crops had been raised like the first who dare have the audacity to say that fifty or seventy-five more good crops could not be raised on the same patch. At any rate Mr. Editor a single bag of it is of vastly greater fertilizing value than any bag of South American Guano on the market.

THE BEAUTIFUL MOUSE RIVER
The same beauty that characterizes the Mississippi river is here in equal degree and in the sense that the Red river of the north may be called the principal river of the Red river valley so in the same sense may the Mouse river be called the Beautiful Mistress of this valley. What the wooded bends and nooks are to the Red the same is true of the Mouse and as she gracefully flows around the curve of the loop country on her Lordly way to the Assinobolia and on to the Hudson bay, her willow shaded clear smooth waters mirror the blue dome of Heaven's opalescent sky.

HER PRAIRIE GRANDEUR
For the whole length and breadth of the valley under the brilliant rays of the North Dakota's sun gleaming in green and gold the prairie roll in gentle undulations to the very rim of the purple world. Vast stretches of flax, barley, wheat and oats green in summer and gold in harvest one vast ocean of green and gold billowed and stirred by the breezes that float across the valley, bringing ozone to man and beast alike. Truly no other section of the great northwest offers a better place for a man to grow. In No. 2 we will give the geological and meteorological conditions that have prevailed in factoring and fashioning the immense productive capacity of the soil of the Mouse River Valley. And offer some predictions on the stupendous growth and wealth of the valley in the near future.
