

DENTAL OFFICES ROBBED.

Dr. Sweet and Dr. Householder Lose Over \$200 Worth of Gold Used for Fillings.

The dental offices of Dr. Householder and Dr. Sweet were robbed of about \$22 worth of gold used in fillings, Monday night. The thieves must have been clever for they used skeleton keys and showed that they were familiar with the dental laboratories. Dr. Sweet considers his loss at \$125 and Dr. Householder about \$100. Dental thieves have been working in the west. Recently a number of Grand Forks dentists were robbed in a similar manner. There is no clue to the thieves.

The deceased was formerly Miss Affa Wallace of Warsaw, Ind., and was quite well known in Towner county. She was married on June 21 at the home of her parents in Indiana, to Rev. Lester P. Warford of Cando and immediately went to Staten Island, New York, to spend their wedding vacation at the summer home of the groom's father. She was taken with a cold on her way to New York and which later developed into diphtheria and after an illness of about three weeks she passed away. She taught school for a number of years in Towner county.

YOUNG DAHL GETS FOUR YEARS.

Conrad Dahl, the 30-year-old Kenmare young man, entered a plea of guilty to the charge of arson before Judge Goss Tuesday afternoon and was sentenced to serve four years in the penitentiary. This is the minimum sentence for this crime. Dahl, who is the son of the manager of the Farmers' elevator at Kenmare, together with Fritz Punk Hanson, embezzled 2,000 bushels of wheat during his father's absence, and then set fire to the elevator, which burned not only that structure, but several others. Hanson is now serving a term in the penitentiary for the part he took in the crime. Dahl is penitent and told the judge he wished to make what amends he could for the crime. He has been a model young man since the crime and he has the sympathy of a good many. The charge of embezzlement was dropped. Dahl is very much attached to his father, who urged him to plead guilty.

OFFICIAL PAPERS.

The Kenmare News and the Carpio News were designated official papers by the commissioners Friday, in place of the Bowbells Tribune and the Mohall Tribune, which are now located in the new counties.

The furnishing of special request printed envelopes by the postoffice department is likely to cease after Aug. 10, 1911, when the present contract for these envelopes expires. A provision of the last postal appropriation bill forbids the department, after the expiration of the present contract to print or sell any stamped envelope bearing upon it a printed direction giving the name of any individual, firm, or company, or any number of any postoffice box or drawer, or any street number or the name of any building to which it shall be returned if uncalled for or undelivered.

MAY MAKE INDEPENDENT FIGHT.
