#### TIMELY TALKS.

Pickings From the Panhandle.

In the "Pan-handle" of Idaho lies Lake Pend d'Oreille. Tributary to this beautiful sheet of clear water, and limited on the east by the Cabinet and Bitter Roo mountains and to the west by the Columbia river, nature has planted one of her choicest pine trees, which until now the woodman's axe has left uncut.

Attention was first drawn to this rough, rugged country by the French Canadians over fifty years ago. Later tales of its gold and silver attracted the adventurer and prospector in civil war times. Still more recently the timber man has shown that this semi-arid, mountainous country produces one of the softest, most velvety species of pine. These trees have grown slowly; their texture is, therefore, fine and close knit. Their bark is very thick and as there is no underbrush they are, to some extent, protected from fires.
