

Navigation on the Ohio River Aided by Opening of Huge Locks



NAVIGATION on the Ohio river has been materially aided by the recent opening of the huge lock at Fernbank, near Cincinnati. This lock is 600 feet long and 110 feet wide. Several steamboats can be raised or lowered around the dam at the same time. One of the pictures shows a typical river steamboat in the lock, while the other shows a section of one of the gates of the lock. This gate, instead of swinging, as most lock gates do, slides back under the bank. It is moved by hydraulic pressure.

Mr. Adolph Henke had a mission at Velva one day last week.



STRETCH WOVEN WIRE FENCE

Method Shown in Illustration Found More Satisfactory Than That of Expensive Implements.

I find this method more satisfactory than doing the work with any stretchers I have ever seen, however expensive, writes W. S. Adams in the Nebraska Farm Journal. A cable attaches wire to wheel, and clamp on posts holds wire in place. Tighten



wire by turning wheel backward. When sufficiently tight brace wheel with a stake to hold it in position till wire is stapled. For clamps I use 3/8 bolted together. For cables one can use three or four strands of wire. The same method may be used for stretching single wire.

American Horses in Australia.
Even in Australia good prices are obtained for American horses. At a recent sale held at Melbourne the horses which brought over \$500 were all imported from America, with the exception of four natives. Several of the offerings from this country sold at prices ranging from \$1,000 to \$1,500.

Pure Bred Draft Horses.
Pure bred draft horses are always in big demand at good prices. Many pure bred stallion colts are sold at \$1,000 as three-year-olds, while pure bred mares bring from \$800 to \$900.
