FORAGE CROPS FOR THE HOGS

Most Satisfactory Method is to Have Necessary Number of Lots for Good Rotation.

(By W. B. RICHARDS, Professor of Animal Husbandry, North Dakota Agricultural College.)

There are two methods that may be employed in providing forage crops for swine. One method is to grow these crops without any regard to lots and use movable or temporary fences to feed the crops off with. Another method is to have the necessary number of lots for rotation of crops, fenced with permanent fences and located near the farmstead. The latter method will, no doubt, prove the most satisfactory. These lots should be arranged so as to be as convenient as possible in relation to the buildings, so that the pigs can be cared for economically. The lots should be as near square as possible for the reason that it will not require as much fencing to enclose them. For example, a piece of land one rod wide and 160 rods long contains one acre, and it would take 322 rods of fence to enclose it. A piece of land 12½ rods square contains an acre of land and requires only 51 rods to enclose it. It is quite evident that this is an important factor to keep in mind in laying out the lots, and the fencing need not be as expensive as one might guess. The cost of constructing suitable fences for hog pasture will be considered later on in this bulletin.

A Rose Hedge.
It is not generally known what a delightful feature a rose hedge may become, even in the villa garden, or such would more often be planted.

Where the area of the garden is limited, or where only a moderately high hedge is desired for enclosing the rose garden or bordering a tennis lawn, a selection should be made from the China or monthly roses, the Japanese or rugosa roses and the Austrian briars. If the garden is very sheltered some of the stronger growing of the dwarf teas could be utilized, and from the free-flowering polyantha group delightful little hedges can be made that would grow to a height of three or four feet.

Destroy Cutworms.
Cutworms are apt to get a start in cool, damp weather. A good way to destroy them is to take a light and search for them at night. They are then on top of the soil and can be easily destroyed. They may also be poisoned with Paris green in sweet bran.

New York's Wonderful and Ever Changing Sky Line

A FEW years have made remarkable changes in the sky line of lower New York. The accompanying photograph shows buildings which would be entirely unknown to a New Yorker who had been abroad five years and fails to show others—skyscraping landmarks in their day—simply because they are hidden by more recent structures. Unmistakable, in the center, towers the Woolworth building, the tallest in the world. The second to the right, with two towers, is the Park Row building, once the tallest office building in New York. The huge new municipal building, with its cupola, is seen at the extreme left. In this general neighborhood, if the observer were in an aeroplane, might be seen two other buildings, each in its time the loftiest in the city—those of the Tribune and the World. Now, from most points on the North river water front, which forms the foreground of the picture, they are invisible by reason of their giant neighbors.
