Mrs. Clarence Stevens of Van Buren township, Renville county, suffered a stroke of paralysis and is critically ill.

The wells of J. B. Hubbard, A. H. Segerstrom, Otto Melhr and Pete Martens at Sawyer, were tested by the state board of health and found unfit for use. It is important that the water from all wells be tested. It may be the means of saving illness or even death.

Oats on the T. N. Wold farm at Sawyer averaged 75 bushels.

Sawyer farmers are paying from six to seven dollars per day for teams and three dollars for laborers. J. E. Toffelmire, one of the city dads at Sawyer has resigned, because he is located in Minot. Edgar Bailey has been appointed to fill the vacancy.

Geo. Carey of Bowbells has a number of crab apple trees that are just loaded with fine fruit. The trees were planted four years ago.

A bad man down near Mott who made a practice of going to town every Saturday night, getting drunk, and return home to terrorize his family, was visited by a couple of his neighbors who tied the fellow, hand and feet with a rope and let him beg for several hours. When set free he was told to march and he is still on his way.
