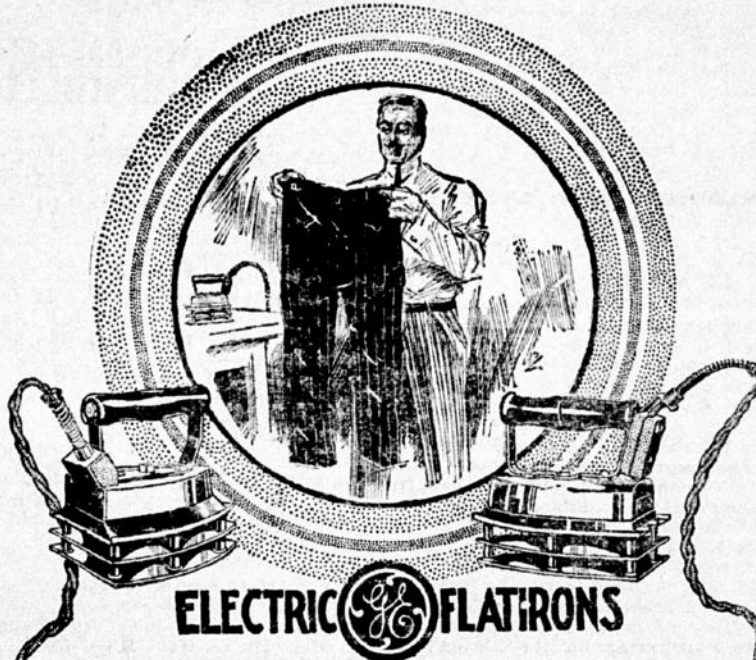

COAL FIELDS BURNING.

Hundreds of thousands of tons of coal, says the Washburn Leader, are being consumed in western North Dakota by fires which are burning in undeveloped mines and action will probably be taken by the state legislature to halt this wanton destruction of the state's natural resources. Evidence regarding the destruction of lignite coal by slow fires was received at a hearing to investigate the possibilities of the North Dakota coal. The state geologist reported that there are approximately 32,000 square miles of coal beds in the state, with an estimate tonnage of 500,000,000,000.

"The burning bluffs" along the Missouri river and over the western part of the state are mentioned as far back as the reports of the Lewis and

Clark expedition, oldest inhabitants declare that many of these "burnin bluffs" or lignite beds, have been smouldering ever since they came to the territory. Miners claim that the fires can be extinguished and there is a movement on foot to turn the task over to an experienced engineer.
