A wave of crime has struck Portal. The Geo. Whittford store at Mohall, after ten years in business, will quit. L. Mixer of Maxbass, a mixer of crops, reports a fine yield of matured corn.

A German lad at Ryder, while hunting rabbits, shot the fingers off one of his hands.

The Deaf and Dumb school at Devils Lake has the largest enrollment in its history.

A barn and seven horses belonging to Charley Jones of Sherwood were destroyed by fire.

The stork left a pretty baby girl at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Kennyston near Sawyer.

The Mohall Tribune denies that Renville county owes a cent to Ward county for the care of prisoners.

J. L. McKinnon, the Sawyer merchant, was called to Hawley, Minn., by the serious illness of his father.

Twenty-two men and fifteen women are now being treated at the state's tuberculosis sanitarium at Dunseith.

Elmer Hawkins, who claimed to be a missionary, was arrested for jumping a board bill at Devils Lake and fined \$25.

Geo. Burns of Westhope has disposed of his entire crop of Durum wheat for seed. He got an average of 28 bushels.

Parties butchering a cow within a block of the Westhope school, furnished an inspiring sight for the teachers and pupils.

Helen Unzen, a Glenburn girl, is recovering from appendicitis at Lansford where she submitted to an operation.

A Williston farmer named Zemliaka, who saved 60 bushels of seed corn, is selling all he has to spare for \$3 a bushel.

Ed. J. Schilling of Sawyer has threshed his bean crop, getting 150 bushels from 9 acres. This is a good paying crop.

The city marshal at Westhope has notified the owners of all chickens, that they must keep their fowls penned up.

E. J. Brown, who will quit farming, will hold a big sale at Kenmare Oct. 4. He offers among other property, 20 head of milch cows, all good ones.

Angus Mordoci was hit by a stray bullet while out duck hunting near Ray and is minus several teeth and will wear marks of bullets in his face for a long time.

Frank Banks, John Shaw and others from McKenzie county are shipping cattle to Chicago this week, driving them across country to Plaza. There are 2600 head of cattle, making 125 cars.

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## News of North Dakota

Telegraph Items of General Interest Gathered From All Sections of the Flickertail State.

### SMOKES AS SURGEON WORKS.

Train Victim Calmly Watches Doctor Amputate Limb Crushed Beneath Wheels.

Fargo.—After his leg had been mangled beneath the wheels of a freight train, Carl Bryans calmly watched City Physician Kaess while he completed the amputation of the limb just below the hip. Bryans smoked a cigarette and talked with bystanders during the operation. He was later removed to a hospital and the leg was dressed.

Dr. Kaess believes that the man's wonderful nerve will insure his recovery.

Bryans stated during the operation, which was performed beside the tracks where he was injured, that he had worked in the harvest fields this summer and was on his way to Minneapolis. He attempted to catch a freight passing through the city, but his coat became entangled in a switch arm and he was thrown beneath the wheels of the moving train. He says he had no living relatives.

### Trapped by Gifts to Girl.

Devils Lake.—Lavish gifts showered on his sweetheart, Miss Devey Osborne of Bowling Green, Ohio, more recently of Springbrook, N. D., led to the arrest by Special Agent Frank Hogan of Delbert Nelson, 19 years old, charged with holding up Joseph Ford, an operator for the Great Northern in this city, and robbing him of \$497.79 of the company's fund. Nelson waived preliminary examination and was held for trial. Through Miss Osborne Agent Hogan learned that Nelson had purchased a watch worth \$50 and a locket and a bracelet, presenting them to her. She displayed her possessions and showed the agent a photograph of her sweetheart. Nelson also had entrusted \$250 to her care last Friday.

### Threshing Practically Done.

Fargo.—Reports from all sections of North Dakota indicate the practical completion of threshing. In the northern and western counties more work remains to be done, and in some sections of the state there is some flax and occasional odds and ends to be cleared up; but at least 90 per cent of the wheat, oats and barley raised in North Dakota this year has been threshed. In the Red river counties practically all the work has been completed. In the central section of the state more than half of the machines have pulled in for the season.

### N. D. Corn Acreage Grows.

Fargo, Sept. 25.—North Dakota has a greater acreage of corn and a larger yield than ever before in its history. There is a greater interest in corn culture than before, and, above all, the state has an unlimited supply of acclimated seed corn of the very highest quality and maturity. The contests of the Better Farming association have created much enthusiasm. The contestants report yields varying from 40 to 110 bushels an acre and the growth of corn from the South Dakota line to the international boundary.

### Potato Buyers in N. D.

Fargo.—There is a rush of potato buyers from the southwest to North Dakota and western Minnesota. The drought in Kansas, Nebraska, Missouri and other states has caused an unusual demand for the North Dakota tubers. The prevailing price is now sixty cents. Some deals are made at less than these figures, but no sorted potatoes are sold much lower. The buyers have been coming in for two weeks and there are additions almost daily.

### Father's Shot Kills Son.

Hillsboro.—While engaged in target practice on his farm, B. J. Wickes fatally shot Joseph Wickes, his son. Several men had fired the revolver, and at the time of the accident the elder Wickes held the weapon. It was accidentally discharged and the bullet entered the boy's neck, severing the spinal cord. Death resulted a few hours later.

### Municipal League Meets in Jan.

Fargo.—Fargo is again to entertain the North Dakota Municipal league. The session will be held the third week in January.

### Congregationalists See Bright Future.

Fargo.—The conference of the North Dakota Congregationalists was ended Friday, after three days of strenuous work. The chief feature of the meeting that encouraged the delegates have been the splendid reports indicating the growth and virility of the organization in this state, the bright future for the church in North Dakota, the new plans for securing able and better Sunday School teachers and securing a closer relationship between the youth of the Sunday schools and the pastors.

M. J. Pearson, of Surrey, who has been suffering from a cancer of the nose for years, has returned from Hot Springs, S. D., where he submitted to an apparently successful operation. Mr. Pearson's nose, with the cancer, was cut away and a new nose formed from flesh and skin cut from his forehead. A hole was drilled thru the roof of his mouth and makes breathing easier. Mr. Pearson, while somewhat disfigured, is delighted that he is again enjoying good health.

John Verzatt of Burlington, who went to Blair, Wis., four months ago, expecting to take up his permanent abode, has returned satisfied that this is the better place to live.

Patrick Horner of Hammerly township, Renville county, was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Adolph Sorenson, on complaint of his wife who charged him with threatening to do her bodily harm.
