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

**LAST CHECK OF COUNTERFEITER**

JAMES CROSS, FAMOUS BOGUS MONEY ARTIST, "CASHES IN."

Fargo, N. D., Oct. 31.—James Buchanan Cross, half century ago known to the world as the cleverest counterfeiter of his day and whose operations covered both this country and Europe, died last evening at 7 o'clock at the county hospital. He has been an inmate of this institution for the past five years and during that time a county charge. It is not known just how old he was but it is believed that he was close to 90 years of age.

Cross was known to the citizens of Fargo and this section of the state as Dr. James B. Crucial, having practiced medicine in this city for about twenty years. His life prior to coming to this city was one of adventure and during the last few years it became known that he has served time in several big prisons in the country.

The last known prison in which he served time was Joliet, Ill. When released he dropped out of existence so far as the secret service men who were always on his trail is concerned and nothing was known of his whereabouts until he was accidentally discovered in the local county hospital about a year ago.

He had changed his name when leaving the Joliet prison and soon afterwards came to this city and started to practice medicine. During the time he lived here he was a model citizen but a man of mystery, but after all this time no one had any intimation that he was one of the most noted criminals in the annals of the country.

During the past few weeks he has been of feeble mind and unable to take care of himself. He denied that he was Cross but has never given an account of his past life to anyone as far as known. About a year ago when the story of his life was published in the papers he showed some interest in the accounts.

John Hahn, of near Metigoshe was doped while at one of the Minot hotels and robbed of some of his money and was brot home Sunday from Dunseith, whither he had wandered, a raving maniac. Sheriff Sandstrom and Ole Nudland, his guardian, accompanied him to the Jamestown hospital Wednesday.—Bottineau News.
