THAW NO MENACE, COMMISSION SAYS

MIGHT BE RELEASED ON BAIL
WITH PERFECT SAFETY
TO ALL.

MENTAL STATE IS IMPROVED

Prisoner Held to Be Free of Disorders
He Suffered at the Time
He Slew Stanford
White.

Concord, N. H., Jan. 13.—Harry Ken-
dall Thaw would not be a public men-
ace if he were released on bail, ac-
cording to the report of the commis-
sion appointed by Federal Judge Aldrich
to inquire into the state of
Thaw's mentality.

No Mental Diseases.
The report says the commission
finds Thaw is not now afflicted with
any of the mental diseases from which
he was suffering when he slew Stan-
ford White.

The finding was announced Sunday.
While the commissioners say that
they have reached "a definite and posi-
tive opinion as to the present mental
condition of Thaw and his probable
state of mind at the time of the homi-
cide," they refrain from expressing
this opinion in view of their instruc-
tions from the court not to "embarrass
any subsequent litigation where the
broad question of insanity might be
involved."

No Menace Now.
"Upon the question of menace or
danger through the granting of bail,
we may, however, be permitted and
probably are compelled," concludes
the report, "to record our finding that
whatever may have been the mental
condition of Harry Kendall Thaw at
the time of the homicide, upon which
question we express no opinion, he is
not now suffering from any of the
forms of mental disease alleged by
the prosecution at the time of the
trials or subsequently thereto, name-
ly: Manic-depressive insanity, para-
nolia, dementia praecox, or delusional
insanity."

"In our opinion it is reasonably
probable that Harry Kendall Thaw's
liberty under bail would not be dan-
gerous or a menace to the public
peace and safety."

Judge Gets Report.

The report is now in the hands of
the clerk of the court and will be con-
sidered by Judge Aldrich early in the
present week in connection with the
petition of Thaw for admission to bail
under habeas corpus proceedings. In
the rescript naming the commission,
the judge said that after the prosecu-
tion of the report the interested par-
ties would have an opportunity to be
heard further before the question of
bail was finally passed upon. No date
for such a hearing has been set as yet.

SURPRISE IN STRIKE PROBE

Conferences of Labor Leaders Record-
ed by Device, Say
Detectives.

Houghton, Mich., Jan. 13.—Evidence
gathered through a telephonic device
concealed in the office of attorneys for
the Western Federation of Miners may
play an important part in future de-
velopments of the copper strike situa-
tion.

It was learned, operatives of a de-
tective agency said, that one of the
instruments was in the Calumet of-
fices of Angus W. Kerr and Edward
F. Legendre for five weeks last sum-
mer, and that more recently conver-
sations between Charles H. Moyer,
president of the federation and O. N.
Hilton, its chief counsel, were record-
ed by the same method.

None of the men concerned in the
conferences seem perturbed by the
revelation. "It doesn't worry us,"
was the gist of their comment.

Moyer Goes to Denver.
Chicago, Jan. 13.—Charles H. Moy-
er, president of the Western Federa-
tion of Miners, who returned to Chi-
cago, was in conference with Yanco
Terlich, member of the executive
council of the federation and left for
Denver. He will familiarize himself
with developments in the Colorado
strike situation and return to this
city later in the week.

Transvaal Disorder in Hand.

Johannesburg, Union of South Africa,
Jan. 13.—Mass meetings called by
the Trades Federation to consider the
railway strike passed off without un-
pleasant incident. The condition is con-
sidered to be favorable with the gov-
ernment in full control. The mass
meeting at Capetown was unable to
agree to a resolution either for or
against the strike. Restricted railway
service continues at all points.

Missouri Judge Is Removed.

Brookfield, Mo., Jan. 13.—Judge
John L. Wilkerson was ousted from
the Linn county court by a decision
of the circuit court, given at Linneus
and received here. Judge Eugene
Sturtevant, Wilkerson's associate, was
reprimanded. It was held that he was
but the tool of Judge Wilkerson. Both
judges were charged with violating
the law in deals between themselves
as individuals and the county court
of which they were a part in buying
and selling livestock, feed and build-
ing materials for public use.

KEEP FROST OFF PIPES.

Every farmer knows what it is to be troubled with frozen water pipes in winter. There are few but have had the experience of having to thaw them out some time or another. In a recent issue of the Country Gentleman a writer says that he has found a successful method of treating the pipes so they will not freeze. The method is described as follows: "After much experimenting I finally hit upon the easiest, most inexpensive and surest way to keep the frost off the pipes. I have recommended it to many people, who have tried it and found it saves many repair bills. Melt an equal quantity of petroleum—vaseline—and of paraffin wax together, and, after wiping the pipes perfectly dry, apply with an old brush a thick coat of this mixture while it is hot. An old lamp or torch will easily keep it in a liquid state. You will find that no matter how cold the weather may get the frost cannot penetrate this coat of grease. I have used this on water pipes that ran along the ground unprotected, and not once during the coldest weather did they freeze up or give me the least trouble."
