### WINNERS OF FIRST TROPHIES

Awards Announced at Grand Forks  
Corn and Clover  
Convention.

Grand Forks. — Crop rotation and  
farm diversification occupied the at-  
tention of the North Dakota corn and  
clover convention Wednesday and the  
subjects proved so important and of  
such general interest that all of Thurs-  
day was given to discussing them.

The corn judging was completed and  
the prize winners announced. The  
Northern Pacific trophy cup, which  
was offered for the best ten ears of  
corn grown in a county traversed by  
that railroad, was won by David Mor-  
row of East Grand Forks. Ten ears of  
yellow dent corn won the trophy.

J. D. Bacon was awarded the Scan-  
dinavian-American bank silver tea set  
which was offered for the best  
matched ten ears of corn competing  
and winning either first, second or  
third prize. An exhibit of white dent  
won this prize.

The livestock class work was de-  
voted to demonstrations of poultry and  
dairy cattle. Gustave Walters of Mar-  
lon, N. D., conducted the poultry ex-  
hibit, while J. E. Donovan had charge  
of the dairy cattle work.

In the horse classes, three types of  
animals were used. They were the  
road horse, represented by the light  
driving animal; the general purpose  
horse, represented by the medium  
sized horse; and the draft horse, rep-  
resented by the heavy Percheron.

The corn demonstrative work con-  
sisted of the study of corn with a view  
toward selecting the best for seed,  
yield and profit. Methods of testing  
seed corn were clearly demonstrated.

Thursday night the visiting farmers  
were entertained by the Grand Forks  
Commercial club, a luncheon being  
served. Close to 1,000 were enter-  
tained.

### MOTIVE POWER AIDS IN WORK.

Implement Men Say Thousands of  
Farmers Are Buying Engines  
and Motors.

Fargo. — Late arrivals swelled the at-  
tendance at the second day of the  
North Dakota and Northwestern Min-  
nesota Implement Dealers' conven-  
tion. The auditorium was the great  
attraction. Great interest was taken  
in new inventions and improvements  
of the old.

Probably the most striking feature  
of the exhibits was the remarkably  
large number for which motive power  
is used to relieve farm work of ob-  
jectionable drudgery. Many of the in-  
ventions of this nature will be sold  
in North Dakota this year. Thousands  
of farmers are putting in small gaso-  
line engines. Still others who live  
near towns, are putting in electric  
motors as more convenient.

### Country Theater Planned.

Fargo. — Citizens are greatly inter-  
ested in the formal opening of the  
Little Country theater at the agricultural  
college. The theater is a model for  
rural and village districts. It has a  
seating capacity of 200, a stage thirty  
feet wide and twenty deep, suitable for  
one-act plays such as can be put on in  
any rural community. There will be  
addresses by President Worst, Profes-  
sor Arvid and others. The theater is  
regarded as an advance step toward  
the betterment of country life condi-  
tions.

### Grand Forks Will Decide March 2.

Grand Forks. — For the second time  
in four years, Grand Forks will vote  
on the question of adopting the com-  
mission plan of municipal government.  
The council has fixed March 2 as the  
election date. The campaign for its  
adoption will be supported this year  
by the Grand Forks Ministerial union,  
which is sponsor for the attempt to  
bring about the change. On the first  
attempt, four years ago, the proposi-  
tion was voted down by a big majority.

### Farmer With Money Missing.

Harwood. — J. H. Johnson, a farmer  
who came here two years ago from Il-  
linois, is missing and his friends fear  
foul play. Three weeks ago he went  
to Fargo and drew \$500 from a bank,  
since which time he has not been seen  
by his friends. Advice from his  
former home say he has not been  
there.

### Oriental Limited Almost Wrecked.

Grand Forks. — The Great Northern  
Oriental Limited train, westbound, nar-  
rowly escaped being derailed at Mapes,  
west of Grand Forks, shortly after mid-  
night Thursday night, when the front  
trucks of the smoker leaped from the  
rails. The car was held to the grade,  
however, and the train brought to a  
stop before further derailment oc-  
curred. Because of the intense cold  
the train was being run on a slower  
schedule and this probably prevented a  
serious wreck. The train was delayed  
several hours.
