Secretary of State Thomas Hall has distributed copies of the North Dakota Blue Book among the newspapermen of the state. This book always contains a wealth of information about this good old state of ours.

The county commissioners of the state are holding their convention in Devils Lake this week.

Alfred Nelson, of Temple, was taken in tow suffering from blood poisoning and a deranged mind, and sent to Jamestown.

Carl Norfjor, a Tioga farmer, was found on the prairie reading a Bible with his hands badly frozen. Authorities have taken him in charge.

The Ross Valley News, which was burned out in the big fire recently, now occupies a new print shop. The News is printed on a new Campbell press and has been considerably improved by Bro. Patterson.

Several cars were demolished in a wreck in the Ray yards last week.

Mayor Neset of Toga, who accompanied a car of stock to Minneapolis, was very angry when he opened his grip to find it filled with brick, the work of some of the boys at home.

The Portal International published a chattel mortgage notice that filled more than a column.

The two-year-old daughter of Jos. Laqua of Tolley died of pneumonia.

He gave a worthless check for \$700 for jewelry and cashed another for \$1000 in Pittsfield. He claims the checks came from his business partner in Alaska for horses and that they had been endorsed by a N. D. banker.

It is rumored that Carl R. Gray, president of the G. N. railway, will soon resign.

Lloyd Young, a Devils Lake young man, recently wrote the following telegram, which was picked up and sent to the King of England by some of his friends: "King George, London, Eng. Received your invitation to the reception. Conditions are such that I will be unable to attend." The King refused to pay the charge of \$6.46 for the cablegram and suit has been instituted against Young, who may have to come thru.

Harvey Davis of Minot has taken charge of the Lansford barber shop.

Geo. Scofield of Grano, brother of "Art" and "Jim" Scofield of Minot, seems to be making considerable headway in his candidacy for sheriff of Renville county. A number of the newspapers are predicting his election.

Carl Feldner, a Carbondale township farmer residing near Donnybrook, won fourth prize for the north-west section for his exhibit of corn displayed at the N. D. Corn Growers' Assn. at Fargo.

Geo. McGee, formerly of Callahan township, near Donnybrook, now a resident of Carmichael, Can., was so badly frozen in a blizzard that he will lose both arms and a leg. He was en route home from town in a blizzard when his horse broke loose from the buggy. McGee remained on the prairie all night. He was found next morning and taken to a Gull Lake hospital.

Atty. H. W. Blichfeldt of Tagus received the sad news of the death of his infant son, which occurred in Norway. Mrs. Blichfeldt is spending the winter there with her parents where the babe was born.

Mrs. Tip Cornish died at the state sanitarium, having suffered for seven years with dementia. The remains were interred at Grano.

Lansford has sent more than 100 listings to Major Murphy, Soo Immigration agent, and the Journal says that town will be one of the first to benefit by the immigration movement.

Mrs. Iver Bieskan, one of the pioneers of the Lansford country, died at Minneapolis where she went during the holidays for treatment.

Mrs. Ole Guttu, wife of the Souris farmer who chased his hire man out of the house upon his return from Europe, is in serious condition. The hired man, seeing Guttu brandish a bread knife, jumped thru a window and ran 2 1-2 miles thru the snow barefoot and clad only in his night clothes and found refuge in the Max Surfert home. He will lose his feet and it is possible that he cannot survive.

Mrs. Guttu, who followed Andrew Lokken, the hired man, thru the window, ran in her night clothes a half mile barefoot to the home of Wm. Nelson, the thermometer registering 27 below. She was badly frozen. Guttu is in jail unable to furnish \$1000 bonds.

Geo. M. Kremer, a prominent New Salem attorney, died suddenly at a Fargo hospital which he entered a few days before for treatment. In 1909 he practiced law at Balfour and at that time was sent to the legislature. He was 34 years of age and was shortly to have married.

Herman Binderwald, a Mandan farmer, claims to have made a profit of \$67 from seven cows in January, besides they gave birth to six fine calves.

Not knowing that his wife had died the day before, Harry Peoples, one of the wealthiest farmers of Walsh county died of pneumonia last week. Two weeks before their eldest son, 13, died and two years ago they lost another son. Four daughters are now ill of the disease.

Real estate and personal property taxes will become delinquent March 1, when a penalty will be added.

The LaMoure creamery, which has been one of the best in the state, has been closed because the farmers shipped so much cream to outside points.

A Ransom county jury decided that a farmer can doctor his neighbor's horse, charge and collect his fee, without going to the trouble of securing a permit as a veterinarian. John White was the defendant in the action.

Some of the McLean county papers are not exactly satisfied because Bishop Cowell's Dogden News was designated an official county paper.
