WARRANTS ARE OUT FOR THE HATCHERS

FORMER FARGO PROMOTERS CHARGED WITH THE EMBEZZLEMENT OF \$11,000—GREW OUT OF NEWSPAPER DEAL.

Warrants have been issued for the arrest of O. M. Hatcher of Minneapolis and M. N. Hatcher of Fargo, former promoters of the Courier-Forum Publishing Co., charging them with the embezzlement of \$11,000. The Courier-Forum Publishing Co., was, it appears, organized for the consolidation of the Fargo Courier-News and Fargo Forum. Stock was sold to the extent of about \$6,000, and a contract made for the purchase of the Forum Publishing Co. A first payment

of \$4,200 was made on the purchase. Later, however, the purchase contract was repudiated in writing, the purchasers claiming that the facts concerning the paper had been misrepresented to them. Suit was started for the re-payment of the \$4,200. In the present action it is alleged that the remainder of the \$16,000 should have been paid back to the stockholders of the company, as soon as the purchase was repudiated. This, the plaintiffs claim, was not done however, the defendants keeping the money for their own use. The plaintiffs include Col. C. S. Whittlesey, Senator W. P. Porterfield, J. T. Purcell, Col. J. M. Kelly, W. L. Farkins, Thomas Hall, secretary of state, and others.
