**ALFALFA ON EVERY FARM**

KILL ALL WEEDS

Cultivate to Keep Down Weeds and Save Moisture—Leave Fall Growth for Winter Protection.

First, I look for well drained soil, free from alkali. From what little experience I have had, I would fall plow alfalfa ground at least eight inches deep. In the spring I would disk it two or three times so as to kill all weeds possible before sowing seed. Never set the disk very angling as this will allow it to go in too deep and loosen up the ground too far down. About the middle of May, sow the alfalfa seed broadcast and harrow down three or four times.

Keep stock off the first year. Clip the alfalfa and if the weeds have taken hold to any great extent leave the clippings right on the ground. My half acre which I sowed this spring is on ground that had been manured quite heavily in 1911 and spring of 1912 and it is very weedy, but I have clipped the patch off twice to keep down the weeds, and the alfalfa looks strong and some of it is in bloom. A sufficient stand must be left in the fall to catch the snow so as to keep it from winter killing. If the ground is high, a light dressing of manure containing lots of straw, will do the work. I tried this on a small patch that survived the drought last summer, and it wintered fine. I hope to keep on trying until I can sow at least thirty or forty acres of it every year or two, as we must get dairy cows and stop raising so much wheat.

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**CUT TOO CLOSE**

Believes Alfalfa Should Not Be Sown With Nurse Crop—Don't Pasture First Year.

I seeded about half an acre of alfalfa some years ago. The second year I cut the first crop for hay; the second crop I left stand for seed. I cut it late and threshed it, but the seed I got did not amount to much. The biggest part of the alfalfa was, I now believe, winter killed as where the snow lay heavy on it there was a good stand. I did not think much of it as I could not raise the seed and I do not know if I had the right kind.

My son graduated from the farm husbandry department of the agricultural college and he insisted on seeding three acres for an experiment. I believe it should not be sown with a nurse crop and it should not be cut or pastured the first year as it needs to stand to catch the snow for winter protection until it gets well rooted. I shall sow some for hog pasture as they seem to be very fond of it.

**ALFALFA EQUAL TO BRAN**

Sowed With Nurse Crop of Barley—Cut Three Crops a Year—Find Alfalfa as Good as Bran for Dairy Cows.

In 1911, I planted on the 18th day of July, with a nurse crop of one bushel of barley to the acre, about eight acres of Montana grown alfalfa. I got a splendid catch, and in the fall cut off the top of the barley, leaving about one foot of stubble and alfalfa on the ground. Last year I cut three crops taking off a little more than four tons per acre in the three cuttings. I believe if I had it to do over I should cut only two crops, leaving the third one to catch the snow for the winter.

I milk from 50 to 60 cows, to which I feed considerable bran and mill feed and I believe a ton of alfalfa properly cured and saved is worth as much for feeding milk cows as a ton of bran which costs on an average about \$20

**ALFALFA ON BENCH LAND**

Use Drill, Sow Shallow, Seven Pounds to Acre—No Nurse Crop.

To grow alfalfa here in Montana, I think the land should be in a good state of cultivation. We usually sow on land that has not raised more than two or three crops. Plow eight to ten inches deep in the fall or summer. Disk until soil is free from lumps. We level the land both ways to get the ground smooth, even and thoroughly packed. Seed any time during the month of May when the ground is in good condition. We try to sow about seven pounds to the acre without a nurse crop.

We always use a drill and sow shallow—about 1½ to 2 inches deep. If land has been cropped for a number of years, it should be well manured. Our land does not require inoculation. With proper cultivation I think alfalfa can be raised successfully on any of our bench land in eastern Montana.
