





MINOT DEFEATS KENMARE IN B. B. GAME

afternoon and resulted in Kenmare being pitted against Bottineau and Willow City against Berthold. Minot pulled the Williston team, but they failed to appear and so forfeited to the local boys.

In the Kenmare-Bottineau game the Gooseneckers won out after a pretty game by the score of 28 to 17. The second game of the evening was not as interesting, though some good basketball was played, and Berthold had no difficulty in winning 24 to 10.

Kenmare's victory Thursday night pitted them against the Berthold team for Friday night and Willow City played the Bottineau boys a twenty-minute game Friday morning to decide which team would play the Minot team for the second game of that evening.

Friday night produced the best basketball of the tournament in the Kenmare-Berthold game. Both teams

fought hard for the privilege of going into the finals the following evening. After a hard fought game in which victory was within the grasp of either team until the final whistle, Kenmare won out with two field goals in the last minute of play. Score 19-17.

In the second game of the evening in which Bottineau and Minot competed, the latter won a slow game without difficulty, the score being 46 to 12.

The results of Friday's games threw the old time rivals, Kenmare and Minot, together for the final game and the championship of this district. These teams had played two games previously, each winning one, and the final struggle for supremacy was a royal battle, in which the local boys succeeded in nosing out a victory by the score of 14 to 9. There was little choice in the teams, both playing hard basketball. Three field goals is credited to each team, Minot being stronger in the free throwing department and won out by that route.

As winners of the district championship, the Minot team is displaying proudly the championship banner, which was hung up for a prize for

the champions of the district. As a result of their victory, they are also at Fargo this week, contesting with Fargo, Dickinson and Grand Forks for state honors.
