

## CANCER CLAIMS ESTEEMED MINOT LADY

FORMER MINOT WOMAN DIES AT WEYBURN, SASK., AFTER LONG ILLNESS—REMAINS INTERRED AT BERTHOLD.

Mrs. Daniel Benton, for five years a resident of this city, died at Weyburn, Sask., after a lingering illness from cancer. Mrs. Benton's remains were brot to this city Monday night, arriving at midnight, to be met by a large crowd of friends. Mr. Benton and two children accompanied the remains which were taken to Berthold Tuesday for interment beside those of two of the children.

Mrs. Benton was 37 years of age. She accompanied her husband, who is a building contractor, to Weyburn, two years ago.

Among the relatives she leaves a

sister residing in this city, Mrs. Theo. Benton, wife of her husband's brother, a brother, Fred Melos, and a sister, Mrs. Chas. Nichols, of Berthold.

### Des Lacs Man Burned.




