**ENSILAGE KILLS 25 HORSES.**  
Frozen ensilage is said to have been the cause of the death of twenty-five horses valued at \$5000 on the farm of Dr. John R. Oxford, Cave Rock, Ill. The state veterinarian said that when the animals ate frozen ensilage a poison settled in the submaxillary glands causing these to swell. Fatal blood poisoning followed.






