

## RHUBARB IS GOOD SUBSTITUTE FOR FRUIT

Rhubarb, or pieplant, is a good substitute for fruit in the spring and early summer. It comes early, produces abundantly, requires but little care, is easily gathered and prepared for the table.

Rhubarb can be started from seed. The best way is to plant roots. They will make producing plants quicker, and then they will be true to type.

The best early kind is the Linneus. It has big, green stalks. The Victoria is a later variety. It has big, red-seeded stalks.

The rhubarb needs a rich soil to do the best. Before planting spade up the soil deeply and mix into it well-rotted manure. It is well to work

some well-rotted manure around the plants every other year. Keep a space of three or four feet around the plant free from weeds and grass. This should be stirred occasionally to keep a dust mulch on it.

The seed stalks that come up on the rhubarb should be cut off. If left to grow they take the strength of the plant and the stalk production is lessened.

The rhubarb is quite free from insect enemies. A borer sometimes infests the crowns but not in this section.

The rhubarb will give splendid returns and requires but a small outlay of labor.

## KITCHEN ECONOMIES.

Scraps Ordinarily Thrown Away May Be Successfully Utilized.

There is a great deal of waste in the American kitchen. Thus the green tops of certain vegetables, such as beets, carrots, onions and radishes, all of which are utilized by cooks of other countries as soup greens, are often thrown away, although they are of food value. Pea pods make a delicious soup if boiled with a small piece of fat pork and some barley or rice and then strained clear.

The stock pot, that treasure of the Tuscan and the French cook, receives all the clean waste that is thrown away by other nations. Even fruit peelings go into it, and the jelly boiling, skimming and straining leave it a jar of broth which quickly jellies in the cold icebox and can be used as a foundation for purees and gravies, as an addition to all gravies and as a factor in the making of forcemeats and sauces.

The lemon, orange and grapefruit peelings, thrown away in many households, make a delicious sweetmeat candied with ginger which would cost next to nothing in the putting up, but not one native cook in ten thinks of utilizing them.

Turnip tops make a fine salad, beautiful as the dandelion. At a dinner given by a woman's club the question of what would go in a salad was tested by the service of a bowlful containing dock leaves, young mint, wood sorrel, chopped chives and sassafras buds. This mixture was garnished with honeysuckles and wild flowers. It was voted a success.

## Favorites of the Gods.

Abyssinia is one of the countries to which foreigners and their own people have given different names. "Abyssinia" is derived from an Arabic word meaning mixture or confusion, in allusion to the mixed character of the inhabitants.
