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THE MEXICAN SITUATION.

Technically speaking, the United States has not declared war on Mexico, altho President Huerta of that republic, may construe it as he sees fit. President Wilson has been granted the permission of Congress to take such measures as are necessary to compel Huerta and his representatives to show the proper respect for our flag. After heaping insult after insult upon this nation, Huerta was given until six o'clock Sunday to make amends by saluting our flag. This he obstinately refused to do. Our fleet is now in Mexican waters and Mexican ports will be blockaded, the customs offices taken charge of, and the Mexican gun boats captured. The United States has been doing its best to keep out of this mess, which has been forced upon us. Huerta saw that the rebels were closing in on him and he no doubt would rather become a prisoner of war of the United States than to be dealt with by his own people. The Huerta government is all in financially and many of his supporters are about to desert him. It is possible that the sly old fellow figured that if he could get the United States to take some part in the conflict it might have a tendency to unite the rebels and the constitutionalists. President Wilson has made it clear that this is not a war of conquest. We want no Mexican property. We do not even desire to fight the Mexican people. The Mexican nation is weakened by internal strife and all the United States wishes at this time is to see that the Mexican government is in capable hands.

President Wilson has been very lenient, most too lenient many have declared, yet war is a terrible thing, and he should not be censured for exerting every influence to keep away from it. All governments will be notified that a blockade is on and Mexico will be cut off from the outside world. If the rebels do not join with Huerta, the northern part of Mexico will not be disturbed. If, however, the rebels resent our action, troops will be landed in Mexico and both factions will be given attention. The problem may become a much harder one to solve than anyone anticipates. It is not believed that any trouble will arise from other nations, as they are all anxious to see peace restored in Mexico.

WORTH WHILE.

Those who prate about the necessity of segregated districts should ponder on the recent report of the Illinois Vigilance association. Since the closing of Chicago's segregated district there has been a reduction of 15,000 a year in the number of cases of social diseases in that city.

"There probably were more than 80,000 cases of social disease traceable to vice in Chicago in 1910," stated the report. "Now, with the district fairly well closed, there are perhaps 65,000 cases in a year. This shows a reduction of 15,000 cases, due to publicity, agitation and law enforcement in the notorious districts."

The report was based on information gathered from physicians.


