# North Dakota News Siftings

Minot.—The local creamery will be reopened soon.

Fargo.—Patriotic instruction is demanded for the city schools by the Sons of Veterans.

Beach.—Two prosecutions for alleged illegal voting have grown out of the recent city election held here.

Berlin.—Charged with complicity in the theft of eight head of cattle, A. G. Schultz is in jail in default of bonds.

Oriska.—Burglars entered the Oriska Mercantile Company's store and stole the cash register containing \$45.

Grafton.—Probate fees collected illegally by Walsh county, under a law that recently was declared invalid will be repaid.

Golden Valley.—Following an address of State Dairy Commissioner Flint, it was decided to establish a creamery at this point.

Fargo.—The Clay-Becker County Medical Society held its spring meeting jointly with the Cass county society, in Fargo, on Monday.

Rugby.—A county farm agent will be placed in Pierce county in a few weeks. McKenzie county will also be supplied with a county agent.

Burkley.—A cheese factory is to be established here. The organization was formed with Martin Gass as president and E. E. Egan, secretary.

Hankinson.—Soo line passenger train No. 106 ran into an open switch and the engine and tender were derailed, tying up traffic several hours.

Minot.—A consolidation of the two dailies, the Optic and the Reporter, is scheduled to take place here May 1.

C. A. Johnson, twice a republican candidate for governor, is conducting the Reporter and will have charge, it is said, of the consolidated publication.

Driscoll.—A horse thief, hidden in a stall, awaited the return of A. P. Rosvold from Driscoll to his farm four miles from here in the evening, then later stole a pet mare. The thief rode the animal to Robinson, where he evidently became frightened and abandoned it.

Devils Lake.—Cando wants better light service. Negotiations have been opened with Frank E. Corson, of Fargo and Devils Lake, to take over the local plant and it is likely the corporation which Mr. Corson represents will add one more to the list of utility plants operated in North Dakota.

Sheldon.—Fred Heaton became a convert to mixed farming and no longer raises grain for the market. Everything grown on his farm is turned into beef and pork and yesterday six steers were sold for \$557. He turns off a half dozen every few weeks, and the income from his farm has practically doubled since he changed from grain to livestock.

Devils Lake.—Ramsey county will be represented at centennial celebration at Christiania, Norway, by Peter Gilberg and Hans Blagner, of Churches Ferry, and A. J. Stade, of Devils Lake. The Churches Ferry men left this week. Mr. Gilberg going early to attend the sixtieth wedding anniversary of his parents at Ringeby, Guldradalen. Mr. Stade leaves next week.

Grand Forks.—The North Dakota collegiate oratorical contest was won by Lester M. Smith, of the University of North Dakota, in the annual state meeting here. Mosberger, of Fargo college, won second. Smith will represent North Dakota in the annual contest with a representative of South Dakota colleges under the auspices of the Western League of Oratory.

Grand Forks.—Meridian road-building forces of North Dakota will become active again when the annual meeting of the state division is held in Grand Forks, May 12, under the call of President E. Y. Sarles of Hillsboro. Delegates from each of the Red River valley counties traversed by the Gulf of Mexico to Winnipeg highway will attend, and plans will be made for active work the coming season.

Minot.—That the automobile is the greatest foe to the successful propagation of game birds is the opinion that was brought out prominently by the state game and fish board of control, which concluded a series of meetings here. At Grand Forks, Devils Lake and in this city sportsmen who appeared before the commission maintained that the auto has made possible greater ease in hunting; that unsportsmanlike auto owners molest nests in the breeding season by driving through fields, and that coveys are early broken up. Considerable sentiment in favor of a later open season for prairie chickens was found.

Larimore.—Richard Fadden, who has been chief of police of Larimore over twenty years, is to be removed from office by Mayor Martin Nelson, who recently became executive through his success in drawing lots with M. Gass, they being tied for the position. W. M. Edwards has been designated by Mayor Nelson as Chief Fadden's successor. Friends of Fadden have been circulating petitions asking Mayor Nelson to retain him.

Grand Forks.—Improvement of rural conditions by the planting of trees along highways has been taken up by the conservation committee of the North Dakota Federation of Women's clubs, of which Mrs. E. W. Cunningham is the chairman. The first step will be in connection with the Meridian highway.

Ashley.—The first blind man ever convicted in the state for a violation of the prohibition law was Christian Scheuffele, an accordion player. He endeavored to increase his income by selling liquor. He will have to serve sixty days and pay a fine.

# JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER

## APPEALS TO ROCKEFELLERS

PRESIDENT ASKS MAGNATES TO END COAL STRIKE.

Nothing Accomplished By Interview On Subject, However—Troops May Be Sent.

Washington, April 28.—President Wilson has made a personal appeal to John D. Rockefeller to bring about a settlement of the Colorado coal strike and end the violence, which has cost a score of lives and large property loss.

Rockefeller, who owns a large part of the mines affected by the strike, in response to a telegram from the president, declared he had turned over his interests in Colorado to his son, John D. Rockefeller, Jr., whom he would ask to cooperate with Chairman Foster of the house committee on mines and mining. The president sent Mr. Foster to New York to talk with the younger Rockefeller.

Nothing Is Accomplished.

New York.—After an extended conference with John D. Rockefeller, Jr., here, Congressman John B. Foster, chairman of the house committee on mines and mining, left Rockefeller's office stating that nothing had been accomplished in the effort to bring about peace in the Colorado strike "war" zone.

Foster visited Rockefeller at the request of President Wilson, it is understood, and explained that unless some effort was made to settle the strike, United States troops would be sent to the scene.

Truce Is Broken.

Pueblo, Colo., April 28.—Three men employees of the steel mill in this city were shot Sunday by alleged strikers near here. They were members of a party of 20 men on their way to Williamsburg in an automobile.

Will Send Troops.

Washington.—President Wilson probably will send federal troops into Colorado to aid in composing the serious situation in the coal fields.

Colorado representatives in congress after conference at the White House, said they expected the troops to be ordered out in the morning.

Governor Ammons' telegraphic request for troops had been considered in conferences during the day. Last night, Senator Thomas went to the White House with telegrams from friends in Denver, telling him that the "situation is getting more urgent every minute." He urged that assistance from the federal government at once was imperative.

The senator had another telegram from Governor Ammons saying that both sides were bringing reinforcements and arms and ammunition into the state. The militia has made no move, the governor said, since the truce was declared; but "nearly all day Saturday and all of Sunday violence on the part of the strikers has continued."

Dynamite Is Used.

Denver, Colo.—Strikers dynamited and fired the Chandler coal camp of the Victor American Fuel company in Fremont county, according to reports to the governor's office, which declared seven men had been killed in the battle.

The few guards and the residents of the camp, numbering 25 to 30, went to Canon City.

Overwhelmed by a force of strikers at the Royal Gorge mine, the handful of mine guards, with Manager E. C. Bettis and all the women and children of Royal Gorge, fled to Canon City. Mr. Bettis said that so far as he could learn the strikers had not occupied the abandoned property.

General Chase was ordered to Canon City with 200 militia to bring about a truce.

State officials, including Governor Ammons, declared the truce which had continued for two days between the strikers in the southern coal fields and the state militia had been broken by the strikers and that the militia now is under no obligation to refrain from aggressive acts to restore peace.

Americans in Capital Safe.

Washington, April 28.—French Ambassador Jusserand announced that the French legation in Mexico City has informed him that all Americans in the Mexican capital are safe. The city now being quiet.
