

Jerry Bacon's Holsteins.

Everybody in North Dakota knows Jerry Bacon. A great many people in the United States, especially among the dairymen, know Jerry very well and know all about his fine herd of Holsteins which he keeps on his big farm just north of Grand Forks. Jerry has something like 180 head of these cattle, mostly registered stock, including a lot of choice young stuff. He's making money from his herd. Jerry lives among his cows. He knows each one's record to the fraction of an ounce and these cows have some records. He has the champion grade Holstein of the United States with a high record of 102 pounds of milk in one day. One of his cows milked 10,016 pounds of milk in four months. A heifer with her second calf milked 86.3 pounds in one day, equal to 43 quarts. One of the cows cost Mr. Bacon \$650 when a calf. He has fourteen high grade bull calves for sale and they are dandies. He will sell them right. His herd bull weighs 2200 pounds. Mr. Bacon has a nice lot of Duroc Jersey hogs and will have 350 pigs this season.
