## N. D. News

Important Doings of Past Few Days Throughout the State. Edited and Arranged for Our Readers.

### FARMERS NEED HARVEST HELP

Labor Commissioner of State Receives Reports from Many Commercial Clubs.

Bismarck.—In keeping with his usual custom, Commissioner Glibreath of the department of agriculture and labor is making every effort to ascertain the number of harvest hands needed in the various counties of the state, together with the probable wages to be paid.

Mr. Glibreath has written to the commercial clubs of the county seats, asking that they secure the desired information and forward it to him.

Mr. Glibreath's letter asked for an estimate of the number of workers needed and the wages offered, as well as a statement of crop conditions.

Herewith is a brief statement, as received from the various counties:

Burke—Crops splendid; wheat heading nicely; 200 to 250 men; wages not stated.

Burlingame—Crop conditions excellent; probably 300 men; \$2 up.

Cass—Crops excellent; 5,000 men; wages \$2.50.

Divide—Crops best ever seen; 2,000 men; wages good.

Grand Forks—Crops never more promising; men wanted and wages not stated.

Hettinger—Prospects for crop good; 500 men; wages \$2.25 to \$3.

Morton—Crops in flourishing condition; 500 men; wages \$3 to \$3.50.

McHenry—Crop conditions ideal; large number of men will be needed; wages as high.

Pembina—Crop conditions not stated; 1,000 to 1,500 men; wages not stated.

Ransom—Crop conditions good; 100 men; wages \$1.75 to \$2.25.

Steele—Crop conditions not stated; 300 to 200 men; wages \$2.50 to \$3.

Renville—Crop conditions could not be better; 150 to 200 men; wages not stated.

Walsh—Crop better than past few years; 500 men; wages \$3.

### NORWEGIAN DAY A FEATURE.

Red River Valley Fair at Grand Forks to Make Much of the Event.

Grand Forks.—Norwegian day will be one of the principal features of the Red River Valley exposition in Grand Forks, July 29. The day selected is especially significant, being the natal day of St. Olaf, a descendant of Harold Fairhair, who united the kingdom in 872.

Dr. J. N. Kildahl, president of St. Olaf's college, Northfield, Minn., will be the principal speaker. He was recently elected to the chair of dogmatics in the United Lutheran Theological seminary at Hamline, Minn. H. Bundeke, vice consul for Norway to North Dakota; P. O. Thorson and Judge L. K. Kassel, are making the arrangements.

The first day of the fair will be known as Grand Forks day; the second will be Norwegian day; the third will be East Grand Forks and Polk county day, and the fourth will be North Dakota day.

### JUDGE COOLEY NOT PRESIDING.

Bribery Case Growing out of Cooper Trial is Subject of Grand Jury Probe.

Grand Forks.—On the eve of the meeting of the grand jury investigating the charges of bribery growing out of the acquittal of McLain Cooper of murder, Judge C. M. Cooley of the Grand Forks district announced that he had asked Judge K. E. Leighton to preside over the sessions. Judge Cooley decided to retire from the case because of his connection with the law firm of Tracy R. Bangs, counsel for Cooper at the time of the trial.

Tracy Briggs is the most prominent of those accused in connection with Cooper's acquittal. Harry J. Cooper, his father, J. C. Mahon, John Stevens and Richard Bruyers are others accused.

J. A. Sullivan, the state's principal witness, bailiff of the jury which is alleged to have been bribed, has been in St. Paul since previous developments were aired in this case. Sullivan also faces the possibility of indictment, he being under bonds at this time for alleged bribery.

### Arrested For Praying Loudly.

Fargo.—For praying too loudly, Peter Johnson was arrested at the Northern Pacific depot. It developed later that he had escaped from the Fergus Falls asylum and he has been sent back. The man was suffering from a mild religious dementia and had been allowed to work on the asylum farm, from which he decided to walk away.

### Outside Suffrage Clubs Aid.

Fargo.—North Dakota's campaign for equal suffrage has aroused such nation-wide interest that unsolicited contributions toward the cause are being received by the state association from all parts of the country. Substantial contributions have been received from a Minneapolis suffrage club and the College Equal Suffrage League of Northern California. Suffragists and antis are preparing for a strenuous campaign, participated in by exponents of both sides.

### GRAND FORKS FAIR PROGRAM.

Norwegian Day One of the Features—Extends From July 28 to 31.

Grand Forks.—Norwegian day will be on the big features of the interstate expositions in Grand Forks July 28, 29, 30 and 31. July 29 has been set aside for this purpose.

The opening day, as usual, will be Grand Forks day, and local merchants and business men are preparing to make it one of the best of the fairs.

The women's department will be much better than ever. Several new features have been added, and many women throughout various sections of the state have entered exhibits of different kinds. The main building space will be all occupied with exhibits of merchants, business men and different industrial houses of the city and northwest.

The entertainment feature will be exceptionally good. The Great International Shows will furnish the Midway attractions and part of the grandstands acts. Several special acts have been secured for the grandstand program. The Great International Shows include the usual line of carnival attractions, including a crazy house, the wild animal show, a minstrel show and several other performances, as well as a large ferris wheel and merry-go-round.

The race program undoubtedly is one of the best that has been obtained for local fairs. The horses entered are among the classiest in the northwest. The big free-for-all race, in which Don Denamore and George Gans, grand circuit racers, will compete, will be the feature card of the week. The other races will be in keeping.

Contracts have been signed with three bands. They are the Larimore Hussar, the Grand Forks and East Grand Forks bands will play daily, while the East Grand Forks band will give the program on Polk county day only. The Larimore band will give a special program on Larimore day.

Norwegian day promises to be one of the biggest of the week. Many Norwegians of North Dakota, who were unable to return to their native land for the centennial celebration, are expected to visit the fair on that day.

### PICTURES SHOW SILO BUILDING.

"Movies" to Portray Construction Methods So That Farmers May Profit Thereby.

Grand Forks.—Methods of constructing brick silos will be exemplified to the farmers of this and other states by means of a series of moving pictures now being taken at the International Harvester company's experiment farm near the city.

An underground brick silo is being constructed under the direction of J. C. Haney, the expert in charge of the farm. Detailed moving pictures are being taken of every step in the work.

When the silo is completed the pictures will be placed on exhibition in various farming communities, and by a study of them the farmers should be able to construct similar storehouses for themselves without outside assistance.

The type of silo now under construction is the ideal one for the North Dakota climate, according to Mr. Haney. It is built underground, only the roof being above the surface of the earth.

Its advantages are cheapness, the impossibility of the contents freezing, less cost of filling, and others.

### TO PRISON TO GET PARDON.

G. L. Bickford, Former State Official, Spends Few Minutes As Convict.

Bismarck.—G. L. Bickford, former state treasurer, convicted of embezzlement more than two years ago and sentenced to the state prison from one to three years, spent a few minutes in the penitentiary and was released on a pardon.

The pardon was granted last month, but before it could become effective legally it was necessary for Bickford to become a prisoner.

Bickford was convicted in the district court of McLean county after he had taken a change of venue from Burleigh county. In addition to the sentence a fine of \$1,000 was imposed.

The case was appealed to the state supreme court, which set aside the fine, but sustained the prison sentence. The pardon was granted soon afterward.

### Want "U" Business Branch.

Grand Forks.—North Dakota merchants in their annual convention adopted resolutions asking the University of North Dakota to establish a bureau in its extension department devoted to the mercantile business. The merchants also asked the repeal of the federal bankruptcy act. Jamestown was selected as the next meeting place. The following officers were elected: President, George M. Pike, New Rockford; vice president, Edward Shilvy, Minot; treasurer, Fred W. Heglow, Glenburn; secretary, W. W. King, Fargo.

### N. D. Man May Be Diplomat.

Fargo.—It is rumored that Harry L. Lashkowitz, a prominent attorney of the city, is to be appointed to the French legation at Paris. Wm. G. Sharpe, of Cincinnati, who has been nominated by President Wilson as the French ambassador is a cousin of City Editor Patterson of the evening paper and it is said that Mr. Patterson has strongly recommended Attorney Lashkowitz. Mr. Lashkowitz is thoroughly familiar with French customs and language.
