J. S. Wallace, U. S. Mining inspector, left Sunday to inspect the government mine at Williston. Judge Wallace has the distinction of being the only mining inspector employed by Uncle Sam. The mine at Williston is the only one operated by the government. The Williston mine was opened up some eight years ago under the supervision of Inspector Wallace. The irrigating project at Williston, for which the water is supplied by the government pumping station, together with the increased requirements of the lighting plant, has made necessary the enlargement of the mining facilities and the Judge will leave soon to take charge of the work pertaining thereto.

L. A. Corey of Minot, deputy consul of the M. W. A., has been in town this week and organized a Woodman lodge.

While in Williston recently J. S. Wallace looked over the Williams flour and feed mill with a view to erecting a similar establishment here. The Judge was favorably impressed by his visit but states that for the present at least he will only grind feed at the mill here, later on the flour mill may be added as conditions may warrant. The building will be moved in position for the new mill as soon as a light fall of snow comes to facilitate the moving, and the placing of the machinery is a matter that will depend, necessarily, on frost conditions. The arrangements will be such that the patrons of the mill can dump their load into a pit, where conveyors will carry it to the grinding machinery and then to an elevated bin on an upper floor, from which the finished product may be conveyed to the wagon without resort to shoveling by hand.
