WHEREAS, Thursby Butte Special School District No. 9, located in McHenry County and comprising the Village of Deering and adjacent territory, has passed a resolution in accordance with Section 133 of the General School Laws of 1911, incorporating Sections 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 34, 35 and 36, the south half of Section 16, the south half of Section 13 of Peebler School District, which is Township 157, Range 81, Ward County, North Dakota, into said Thursby Butte Special School District No. 39, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved by the Board of County Commissioners, Ward County, North Dakota, that inasmuch as a petition has been presented in accordance with Section 133 of the School laws of 1911, that the south half of Sec. 16, the west half of Section 21 and all of Section 28 is hereby taken from Thursby Butte Special School District No. 39, and is henceforth a part of Peebler School District No. 63, of Ward County, North Dakota.
