J. M. Vatsvog, an Upham heavy-weight, broke thru the depot platform and was injured.

A 30 horsepower electric motor and centrifugal pump will be installed at the Velva water plant, which is one of the best for its size in the state.

Stock got into the oats bin at the Grant farm near Adams, and knocked a five pound box of Paris Green down, mixing it with the feed. Two horses and two cows died.

Colonel Bloom, Devils Lake publisher, is in Minot today. The Colonel says Mrs. Bloom still has a strangle hold on the Devils Lake postoffice and there isn't much danger of it's slipping away from her.

Col. H. W. Matz of Tuttle caught an immense gray wolf, weighing 95 pounds with two of his Russian Borizon hounds. The Colonel has caught 300 wolves around Tuttle with his hounds during the last four years.

According to the Granville Herald, eggs took a big tumble, dropping from 30 cents to 15 cents a dozen at that place. In Minot they have been selling at from 25 to 30 cents a dozen. Country produce always brings a fancy price at the Minot stores.

Editor Olsen of New Rockford tells of a Sunday morning hiking club, formed by several bachelor maidens, who walk eight miles before attending Sunday school, but will not divulge the route for fear that it will become congested with eligible bachelors.

Dr. Lauritz Larsen, president emeritus and founder of Luther College at Decorah, Ia., is dead. For 41 years he was president of that institution. Hundreds from this section of the state, who attended the college, join thousands from all sections of the country in expressing sorrow over the death of the great man.

Ten thousand farmers in western Canada, have been allowed free seed grain by the government, but 60,000 who had sold their wheat, were turned down. The price for wheat there is \$1.50 per bushel and oats 85 cents.

Figures compiled by the postal authorities show that since the begin-

ning of the war, 864 German newspapers have suspended publication.

The hotels in Norway and Sweden are crowded with tourists, as those are about the only countries in Europe out of the war zone.

The automobile industry in America has been augmented by the European war. Well to do Americans are buying machines and will spend the summer in "seeing America first."

The European countries are gradually tightening their strings in anticipation of a long drawn out war. Russia has forbidden the exportation of any food stuffs and England has resolved to commandeer any of her factories for war purposes.
