FRISCO EXPOSITION NOTES.
Beautiful pennants from Milton, Dickinson, Nortonville, Inkster, Cavalier, Medora and Powers Lake have been received at the North Dakota building at the exposition during the past week. There is room for many more.
Newspapers in North Dakota would do well to investigate seriously and prayerfully any scheme that carries with it a trip to the Exposition for the most popular young lady or gentleman. The promoters of these contests usually have a very selfish motive, and when the inches of publicity are figured up, the newspaper is the loser by many dollars. The average person that enters these contests spends more money than the whole trip out to the exposition would cost him in the first place, and consequently a great deal of trouble and expenditure of money ensues, both for the winner and losers. Think twice before you give the columns of your newspaper for this purpose.
When coming to the Exposition do not get the idea that you must see all of San Francisco by your lonesome. If you feel that you must go through Chintown, Barbary Coast, and other places, where policemen go in pairs, it will be well to place yourself in the hands of a regularly licensed guide. Of course the average man feels that he is big enough to go thru these places by himself, but discretion is always the better part of valor.
At the present time numerous tour companies, who take charge of the eastern tourist upon arrival at San Francisco, and furnish everything for a week at so much per, are getting busy in North Dakota, owing to the fact of an expected rush from the prairie state to the exposition during the month of June. There are good and bad tourist companies doing business on the coast, and it will be well for those from North Dakota to thoroughly investigate any of these companies before closing deals with them. The Secretary of the North Dakota Commission, stationed at the building at the exposition, will undertake to investigate any of them upon request. There are some very good companies in the business, and just because there are others not so good is no sign that all should be ignored, for some of the side trips about Frisco are really worth taking, while the arrangements made for hotels, taking care of baggage and the like is well worth the money expended by the tourist. So if you have any doubts address the secretary in care of the North Dakota building, and he will immediately let you know just how responsible any of these companies are.
The Secretary has a letter from the commercial club of Mott, stating that a large number of people from Hettinger county are figuring on coming to the exposition during June. They ask a date for Hettinger county day. This is the right spirit, and if more communities would come en masse, North Dakota would get a great deal of desirable advertising.
The City of Minot has asked for dating for a special day at the North Dakota building, and the stunt the Association of Commerce will pull off will be a startler. Secretary Hollenga also has something else good up his sleeve, and it will be well for our readers to watch this column from week to week. The Secretary of the Commission would be very glad indeed to book many more cities and counties for special events at the North Dakota building during the exhibition period. When figuring on a special day, plan something good in the way of a souvenir to give away to the visitors, and are keeping them. Two other states are going to copy after the plan of the North Dakota exhibit at the exposition. Instead of using the exposition palaces, they will place their exhibits in their own state buildings, as the commissioners believe that North Dakota has the right and proper idea in this regard.
Several state laws that North Dakota has now on its statute books will be introduced in at least one of the southern states the coming year. We refer to the blue sky law and the law allowing women to vote on educational matters.
The Secretary of the North Dakota Commission at the exposition now has a dependable list of rooming and apartment houses. Rooms or apartments may be rented by the day, week or month, and an effort has been made to get these rooms and apartments as close to the grounds as possible.

SAVE THIS FORMULA

Dear Editor:
Many inquiries are coming in for the formula for the preparation of gopher poison. I am advised that the supply of State bulletins giving this formula is very limited and that I cannot secure enough of them to supply the farmers of Ward county. In order that the farmers of the county may get this formula quickly will you kindly publish the following asking your readers to cut it out and save it for reference.
1. Mix thoroughly one ounce of strychnine alkaloid (powdered) and one ounce of baking soda. (One heaping tablespoonful).
2. Sift this into 3-4 pint of thin, hot starch paste and stir to a creamy mass. The starch paste is made by the dissolving of one heaping tablespoonful of dry gloss starch in a little cold water, which is then added to 3-4 pint of boiling water. Boil and stir constantly until a thin, clear paste is formed.
3. Add 1-4 pint (8 tablespoonfuls) of heavy corn syrup and a tablespoonful of glycerine and stir thoroughly.
4. Add 1-8 ounce (one tablespoonful) of saccharine and stir thoroughly.
5. Pour this poison solution over 20 parts of oats (clean) and mix thoroughly so that each grain of oats is coated. Prepare it 24 to 28 hours before using. For mixing small quantities a tight, smooth box may be used, and mixing be done with a shovel.
6. A teaspoonful of the poisoned oats should be placed near each ground squirrel hole on clean, hard ground, letting it scatter slightly as it falls. (Placed in this way it will not endanger stock.) Do not put the poisoned grain on the loose dirt of the mound or into the hole. Each quart of the poisoned grain is sufficient to treat about 80 holes.
