## TOWN'S GLORY HAS DEPARTED

Beautiful Mentone One of the Worst Sufferers From the Great European Conflict

For those who love the sun in winter, who love the Riviera in the less garish colors that Mentone provides, there must be a real feeling of grief to learn that the little border town is empty of its old colony—that the great hotels that look down on the snug and the warmest corner of the whole Cote d'Azur are empty of guests, their genial Teutonic proprietors are in prison, and in place of all that made life quietly pleasant there are only the sad evidences of war, the wounded and waiting.

Gone is the Hungarian news vender, with his wonderful sheaf of Magyar papers. Gone are Russian, Polish, Prussian, Belgian, British, Servian, Turkish colonists. The little donkeys that bore happy children along the beach are perhaps hauling ammunition in the far-off Argonne. The Chasseurs Alpins, once met on all the mountains, stepping off proudly to the bugles, are now on the battle front, the vanguard of the army of redemption in far Alsace.

Vanquished are the races which lived in polyglot peace and took their losses philosophically in the nearby Casino at Monte Carlo. There is now the grief of war. Gouty Prussian generals no longer stalk majestically through heliotrope-hedged walks; they are now in Champagne or Flanders—enemies, in fact. From Mont Agel the bugles still call across at dawn and sunset to the distant call of Ciracocca, but the garrisons are gone. —New York Tribune.

## Back to the Classics.

As a university president Doctor Butler objects to this practice of "turning academical teaching into an exercise in contemporary journalism." Too many American professors, he thinks, give way to this temptation, which is pressed on them by public appeals for their opinions on current topics. "If one be a profound student of Plato he is expected without warning to pass an illuminating critical judgment upon the latest outgiving of Mr. George Bernard Shaw. If he happens to be well versed in the economic thought of Germany and Austria he is called upon for an authoritative expression of opinion regarding the strike of coal miners in Colorado." Possibly there are some British as well as American professors who would gain in ultimate reputation by paying heed to Doctor Butler's warning.

## U. S. Pays Wages Due in 1864.

Frederick Andrew Jackson Stone recently came into his own after waiting fifty-one years. Mr. Stone was a government claimant and shared the common fate of such people. In 1864 he was an engineer on the Chattanooga & Nashville railroad while it was being operated by Gen. William Tecumseh Sherman as a military necessity. There was a balance due him of \$69.75, which the comptroller of the treasury allowed and, after deducting a war tax of 64 cents, the amount was sent the claimant at his home in Tallapoosa, Ga.

## Rifle Range in Palace.

With the permission of the parliamentary authorities, a rifle range has for the first time in its history been established in the palace of Westminster, London. The name of the body under which this step has been taken is the Westminster Palace Rifle club. The range is situated beneath the Royal gallery, where there is accommodation for four targets, and it has been established in the main for the use of the younger officials in both branches of the legislature. It is hoped, however, that the range will also be used by the members of both houses of parliament.
