"THIRTY" FOR OLD BILL MUMBY

ONE OF THE STATE'S OLD TIME PUBLISHERS, W. R. MUMBY, Sr., DIED AT HOSPITAL AT WILLISTON FROM AUTO INJURIES.

W. R. Mumby, Sr., known all over the west as "Old Bill," passed away at a private hospital at Williston Monday evening, July 19, as a result of injuries received in an auto accident near Williston June 16. Funeral services were conducted from the M. E. church at Williston the following Wednesday. Old time friends, Geo. Metzger, Ole Peterson, J. A. Gilmore, H. L. Burdick and Chas. Mansfield were the pall bearers.

William Rozelle Mumby was born at Fon du Lac, Wis., April 27, 1842. He served as an infantryman in a Wisconsin regiment during the Civil war. He was married to Miss Beattie M. Davis of Cresco, Ia., immediately following the war and to this union ten children were born, nine of whom survive. Mrs. Mumby died several years ago.

Altho he was 73 years of age, Mr. Mumby continued to publish the Fairview, (Mont.) Tribune until a few weeks ago when he turned the paper over to his son. He was one of the "youngest" old men the writer has ever known. Despite his advanced years, he did not appear to be much over the half century mark.

Mr. Mumby often related stories to the writer of his early experiences in the printing game. He was foreman of one of the early St. Paul daily newspapers, forty years or more ago. He was regarded as one of the top notch printers of the west in those days. In the spring of 1898, Mr. Mumby located at Buford as a representative of the government, being associated with Colonel Lounsberry. In August, 1899, he established the Buford Tribune, which he published there until a year or two ago, when he moved his plant to Fairview, Mont. "Old Bill" was a man very strong in his likes and dislikes and if he didn't like a man, he was just as apt to spell his name, dispensing with the use of capital letters. He was regarded as one of the most fearless editors in the state. Mr. Mumby was a good mixer with his friends who were legion. We will all miss our old time friend.

CLAYTON CONGLETON HORRIBLY INJURED

AUTO COMING DOWN SOUTH HILL NEAR BURLINGTON TURNED TURTLE—PAUL PALMER RECEIVES INTERNAL INJURIES.

Special to the Independent: Burlington, N. D., July 28.—On Tuesday evening as a party consisting of Clayton Congleton, Thomas Filbert, Rodney Hunnewell, Paul Palmer and John Bestland were approaching town via the south hill, the auto skidded and turned over as they rounded the last curve on the grade before entering town and the occupants of the car were thrown out with terrible force, Mr. Congleton receiving very serious injuries.

The injured man was immediately placed in an auto and rushed to the hospital at Minot, where his injuries were attended by a physician, and at this writing he is resting as easily as could be expected under the circumstances.

The top was up and the car running at a fast clip and it is a miracle that a single one of the occupants of the car escaped alive. Mr. Congleton's injuries are the most serious of any in the party, consisting as near as we can learn, of a broken nose, a fracture of the malar or cheek bone, and a bad gash over the left eye, also several severe cuts about the scalp. Later developments may show internal injuries.


Brinsmade met the Minot team on the local diamond Wednesday evening, being defeated in a mighty fast game, 2 to 0.
