Mrs. A. G. Burr, wife of Judge Burr, is precariously ill from heart trouble at Rugby.

Mrs. Jacob Lessman, aged 72 years, died at the home of her son, Wm., east of Mohall.

Mohall will hold an "After Harvest Celebration" sometime during the present month.

W. T. Cooper, who publishes the Benedict Banner, has installed a new paper at McLaughlin, S. D.
