Jack Crow, who was seriously injured at Rugby a couple of weeks ago, died in the hospital in the above city last week.

Grand Forks will carry the permanent injunction against the erection of a new school building to the higher courts of the state.

A wheat bar on a car loaded with wheat pulled out at Beach the other day and the car was so damaged that a lot of grain was spilled on the right of way.

John Kent, of Lansford, was summoned to Battleford, Sask., to visit a brother who was reported wounded. No particulars of the accident have been learned.

Swindlers who shipped two cars of wheat from Sargent county a few days ago got away with \$2,000 in cash. A detective and four assistants were employed by the Great Northern railway to hunt out the guilty parties.

A daylight fire started in a row of wooden buildings at Hatton the other day. It caught in a restaurant from a defective gasoline lighting plant and in a short time a block of the business section of the town was burned to the ground.

Construction work on the Soo Line bridge across the Missouri river is to commence some time in February, according to reports received at Sarnish recently. It is reported that the company is already hauling in bridge material by the train loads.

In a test of a flock of poultry by the Veterinary Department of the North Dakota Experiment Station, it was found that 3 per cent of the year old chickens had tuberculosis, 24 per cent of the 2 year olds, and 86 1/2 per cent of the 3 year olds. The hen over 2 years old is usually not a profitable producer.

Five hundred farmers living in the southeastern part of the state have brought suit against the state of Minnesota, claiming damages caused by the flooding of the Bois de Sioux river into which the Minnesota drains empty. The farmers affected fix their loss at about \$10 per acre. A fund has been created amounting to about \$5,000 to prosecute their claim.

After due consideration the business men of Epping have decided to organize a company and establish an electric light plant. Thirty-two shares have been sold and it is expected that more will be added later. Tollef Bjela has been engaged to furnish the room and operate the plant. Mr. Dougherty, from Williston, is wiring the city and it is expected to have ample light by Christmas.

Mrs. H. A. Olson, residing upon the Ole Hanson farm east of Minnor, has fallen a victim to the ravages of the great white plague and has been admitted to the sanatorium at Dunseith, N. D., for treatment. This is the first case from Sargent county to be admitted to that institution and that only through the persistency of the present superintendent of the county board of health. It is to be hoped that Mrs. Olson may recover.

Howard Chapple, claiming St. Peter, Minn., as his home, is under arrest at Devils Lake. He claims that he killed a man in that city some time ago. Chapple's story was that he and another man had killed the Devils Lake man and that his partner was now serving time for the job, while he escaped with the money they had obtained while committing the crime. He is being held while the authorities are investigating his confession.

The six year old son of Mr. and Mrs. John Williams, living near Barney, a small place close to Wymdmore, was found dead hanging from a window of the chicken house and it is thought that he had been in that position for about two hours. The family think the little fellow had been feeding the chickens and had climbed up to watch them eat thru the window, which accidentally dropped down on his neck, causing strangulation.
