Railroad rumors are again in the air. The Great Northern is supposed to build a line from Temple in Williams county, to Plentywood, Montana. A new proposition of an electric line from Williston to Westby is also considered a possibility.

The Underwood schools having been closed on account of the existence of smallpox, Miss Grace Holbrook, one of Underwood's efficient teachers, went to Bismarck last Friday and is a guest at the home of her sister, Mrs. C. H. Crockard.

Antler is cursed with that cur of humanity known as a dog poisoner. He "got" L. J. Buckmann's dog last week, and incidentally a yearling heifer that presumably ate some of the dog's vomit after the poor brute had crawled back to the barn to die.

An old horse, unable to proceed farther, was abandoned near Kindred by some gypsies. The gypsies went on, but a dog returned to the horse, and remained with him until he died. When persons tried to get the carcass to bury it, the dog fought valiantly until subdued.

The Masons at Ambrose occupied their new temple home for the first time Wednesday evening. The interior of the building is still in process of construction, but it is expected that in a short time the lodge members will have a fine fraternal home and a structure of which the city of Ambrose will be justly proud.

Deputy Sheriff Blaine McAneny and F. C. Robeson of Cando left Wednesday with Albert Johnson in charge, who had been adjudged insane. They were taking him to Devils Lake, at which place he will be turned over to officers of the state asylum for the insane and conducted to that institution at Jamestown. Mr. Johnson has a claim in Canada.

While Joe Mertz was out with a herd of cattle near Rhame he espied a large bird sitting on a butte a short distance away and succeeded in crippling it with his rifle, thereby enabling him to kill the bird. It proved to be a rare specimen of the black or desert eagle of the Nevadas and measured seven feet three inches from tip to tip of its wings.

Resources of North Dakota banks were \$13,114,189.00 greater at the last call of the state bank examiner than at the preceding call, according to figures given out by Geo. J. Johnson, state bank examiner. The total resources of 828 state banks and four trust companies reporting is placed at \$85,289,685.69. In deposits the banks gained a total of \$14,024,330.05 in money subject to check; \$167,356.28 in demand certificates, and \$47,396.60 in savings deposits. The time certificates of deposits were decreased by \$1,296,379.51.

The death sentence passed on Mrs. Jennie Hawkes, in the McLeod, Alta., jail, for the murder of her husband

near Watiskewin, Alta., has been commuted to ten years in prison. Petitions signed by thousands of men and women in western Canada and North Dakota, the woman's former home, demanded commutation. She stated at the trial that she killed her husband when she heard him plotting with another woman to put her in an asylum for the insane. The jury recommended clemency, but the court im-

posed the death penalty. A couple of weeks ago John Hel, near Selz, had a pony stolen. At least it is believed that a peddler who passed through there and who talked of buying the animal, knows something about its present location, as the horse disappeared shortly after the owner refused to sell to the transient. The sheriff was notified.

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
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
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
