## THREE KILLED BY ST. PAUL DETECTIVES

DEADLY GUN BATTLE TAKES PLACE IN SALOON — ONE OF THE BANDITS WAS IN MINOT NOV. 14.

One of the worst gun battles known in St. Paul took place at 6 o'clock Friday evening at James McDonough's saloon, 782 Rice St., when three bandits were killed by two detectives, one of the detectives being shot twice thru the breast and once thru the mouth, two teeth being knocked out. He will recover.

The detectives are Paul Gottfried and John McKinley and they did fine work. They had been lurking in the rear of the saloon, expecting trouble, when three men with masks entered the saloon from the rear. One of the detectives went around to the front of the saloon, leaving the other to guard the rear. The bandits began firing into the ceiling to frighten the crowd and spying the detectives, opened fire on them. The detectives were too fast for them. One of the dead men is believed to be "Montana Pete," noted train and bank robber. Charles Carson, of Winnipeg, one of the other dead bandits, had been in Minot Nov. 14, according to his diary, but he did not record having held up anybody.

St. Paul has been the scene of bold hold-ups and robberies daily and the authorities have engaged 40 detectives who have been instructed to shoot to kill if necessary in order to rid the city of the bad element.
