FARMERS HAVE RIGHT TO ORGANIZE

**MURRAY SAYS THOSE IN OTHER
LINES OF BUSINESS MAINTAIN
ORGANIZATIONS AND LOBBY
OBJECTION.**

There has been used a strong ef-
fort to defeat the farmers' organiza-
tion known as the Nonpartisan League
on the grounds that the organizers are
charging \$6 per member. No fair
minded man will confess to belonging
to an organization which charges a
similar fee and at the same time use
the "cost" argument against the farm-
ers. Then the question arises, who
is it that can oppose the farmers' or-
ganization?

The hardware men pay \$5 per an-
num to maintain their organization, so
they cannot object.

The merchants have a state organ-
ization and pay \$5 to join and \$1 per
annum as dues, so they cannot object.

The buttermakers have recently or-
ganized and charge their members a
fee to maintain their organization, so
they cannot object.

The grocery merchants have a
strong organization and pay dues to
maintain it, the Merchants' Trade
Journal of Davenport, Ia., is charging
\$3 per annum for subscriptions, and
promising to use \$2 of the amount
with which to send lobbyists to the
next legislature for the purpose of se-
curing legislation for their benefit, so
they cannot object.

The physicians have an organiza-
tion and pay \$5 per annum as dues,
sent a strong lobby to the last legis-
lature and paid out a large amount in
advertising to defeat a bill to allow
another school of medicine to have
licenses to practice medicine, so
the physicians cannot object.

The undertakers have an organiza-
tion and pay \$5 to become members
and then pay \$3 per annum as dues,
so the undertakers cannot object.

The telephone companies are or-
ganized and sent highly paid lawyers
to the last legislature to lobby, so they
cannot object.

The engineers, firemen, conductors,
telegraph operators and other railroad
men have organizations and pay dues
to maintain their organizations, so
they cannot object.

The school teachers, school officers,
county and state superintendents have
an organization. They draw dues
(pay) and expense and pay for their
time while attending their own orga-
nization, so they cannot object.

The county auditors, treasurers,
etc., pay dues to maintain an orga-
nization, and now are actually collect-
ing a fund to test the constitutionality
of a law which involves the amount
of their salary. The county commis-
sioners have an organization and pay
\$2 per annum to maintain it, so they
cannot object.

The I. W. W. (Idle Weary Willies)
have an organization and pay dues
to maintain their organization, so they
cannot object.

The bankers of North Dakota have
an organization and pay \$10 per an-
num as dues to maintain it. Last
year they paid \$20 dues to fight the
reduction of the interest rate. They al-
so have an official paper published at
Fargo. They have standing commit-
tees as follows: On Agriculture (they
would not consider it a Leap Year
proposal if the farmers' organization
should appoint a committee on bank-
ing), on Legislation, on Immigration
(but they never import any bankers),
so they cannot object.

The lawyers have an organization
which is recognized by law and they
pay \$5 per annum as dues, so they
cannot object.

The printers pay 75 cents per month
as dues and in addition one per cent
of their salary to maintain their orga-
nization, making a total of \$12 per an-
num, so they cannot object.

The newspaper men pay \$3 per an-
num as dues. Last year many paid
from \$5 to \$10 each and sent a lobby
committee to the legislature, so they
cannot object.

So those unfortunates kept under
the guidance of the state at James-

town, are the only ones who can
consistently ridicule the farmers for pay-
ing dues to maintain an organization.
For any other class to poke fun at the
farmers would be like the "kettle call-
ing the pot black."

In justifying the farmers' organiza-
tion I desire it understood that I ap-
prove of the following principles ad-
vocated by the League, viz:

1. An appropriation by the state to
supplement the terminal elevator at
St. Paul.
2. Control of the dockage, weights
and grades by the state.
3. State hail insurance.
4. The principle of a Single Tax on
farm lands.
5. A Rural Credits banking system
operated at cost for the farmers.

I also favor co-operative flour mills,
packing houses, cold storage plants,
and stock yards by farmers, but I
doubt the wisdom, hence opposed, to
the state building and operating them.

While all the organizers, officers,
speakers, advisers, etc., are Socialists,
yet they are men who think. Hence
when it comes to a show-down with
them as to which they hold most sac-
red, the Farmers' organization or the
promotion of the Socialist party, I
cherish the hopes that they will drop
those principles which only Socialists
can endorse. For a reflection of their
promises to be "Non" partisan, just-
ifies my predictions in the matter.

I have ever been and shall ever be

for a farmers' organization, but I have
always opposed and shall always op-
pose those things which being selfish
in their nature, have always destroy-
ed and will always destroy the labor-
ers' organizations. They have always
and will always destroy the organiza-
tion because they are based on the
principle that "Two wrongs make a
right."

to be necessary to turn on the water.
